

Mr. John S. Haywood, eldest son of the late John Haywood, was yesterday elected by the Legislature, Treasurer of the State for the ensuing year, by a majority of 136 votes over his competitor James Seawell, Esq. of Fayetteville.

The balloting for Comptroller takes place this day. The following gentlemen are in nomination for the office, viz. John L. Henderson, of Salisbury, (the present incumbent,) James Legrand, of Anson, John H. Greene, of Warren, James Grant, of Halifax, Thomas Blackwell, of Rockingham, David Stone, of Raleigh, James Houze, of Franklin, Samuel S. Downey, of Granville, Aubrose K. Ramsey, of Chatham, R. W. Goodman of Lenoir and Archibald M'Nair of Richmond.

We have seen a model of a Railway by Mr. NASH, our Engineer which seems peculiarly adapted to a country like ours. It is what is called a single elevated Railway and may be alike advantageously used for the transportation of heavy burthens or the rapid conveyance of persons. Its utility has been tested in England, and it recommends itself to us, on account of its economy. The Rail is to be of wood with Iron castings laid on its surface and keyed to it, for the wheels of the carriage to run on. It may be of any desirable size according to the probable weight it may have to sustain; and is to be set on posts of unequal length, so as to preserve a perfect level on an uniform inclined plane. To the posts, will be fastened cross sills projecting several feet from each side, so that plank can be laid down to form a path to cross ravines or any depression of country, thus avoiding the expense of culverts and embankments. A shed, not unlike a covered bridge, can be put up to protect the whole work from the weather, the consideration of always having a dry path to use, as well as being at all seasons effectually sheltered, may counterbalance any extra expense on this purpose.

Mr. N. has also constructed a double elevated Railway, which is on different principles from any hitherto invented. It will have all the advantages of the single Railway for shelter and bridges, and is better adapted for the conveyance of large burthens. It consists of two Rails made in all respects like the single one, placed a few feet apart on the same level, and parallel to one another, the whole distance. On this Railway four wheels are to be used, two on each Rail. Between the Rails a box is to be attached to the wheels which are connected with each other on the Rails by trundle bars. On the outside of each Rail is another box attached in the same manner, the effect of which is always to keep the wheels in an exact upright position, thus avoiding all lateral pressure or friction, a great inconvenience in all Railways hitherto made. The lateral friction being obviated, the surface of the castings may be made sharper, consequently, the friction is still further diminished and the castings are less liable to be worn down or flattened by use. Indeed the wheels of the carriage of the model turn quite easy with a considerable weight on them, without moving the carriage though they all are of wood. The surface of the Rails are of wood also, ground out and fixed as the castings are intended to be; but when the whole are fitted out with iron, there can be no doubt that the tractive power on the weight over a pulley necessary to draw an hundred pounds will be considerably diminished from what it is on any plan heretofore adopted.

A meeting of the citizens of Newbern, has been recently held for the purpose of memorializing the next Congress, on the subject of improving the navigation of the several sounds and rivers which empty themselves into the ocean, at Ocracoke bar, and particularly the Swash, which it is supposed may be removed by the constant use of Dredging Machines.

Anti Jackson meetings.—The contemplated Meeting in Carteret, was held as proposed on the 17th inst. and notwithstanding that county is cut up by water courses, which are frequently impassable, one hundred and twenty friends of the Administration attended. Letters were also received from distant parts of the country, from influential gentlemen who assured the meeting, that a great majority of the people in their respective neighbourhoods, are friendly to the re-election of John Q. Adams. Our correspondent says, that this county may be put down as decidedly for the Administration. The proceedings of the meeting shall have a place in Friday's paper, if practicable, and we will endeavour to make it so. Dr. James Manney and William H. Borden Esq. were appointed Delegates to the proposed Convention in this city.

By reference to a public notice in today's paper, it will be seen that many of the freemen in Wayne County have called an Administration meeting, to appoint Delegates.

A large Meeting has also been held in Camden County, and the second Saturday in next month, is fixed upon for a meeting in Perquimons.

Small Pox.—The hopes entertained that this loathsome disease had subsided in Edenton, have been dissipated by the occurrence of two new cases, out of the infected premises.

An entire change has been made in the State Officers of Georgia, by the Legislature, now in session. Hines Holt is the new Treasurer—Thacker Howard, Comptroller, Everard Hamilton, Secretary of State, and T. Mitchell, Surveyor-General. R. H. Wilde is elected a Representative in Congress, vice Mr. Forsyth, chosen Governor.

General Assembly.

SENATE.

Thursday, Nov. 22.

Mr. Gray presented a bill to prevent the falling of timber in, or obstructing the run of Caraway Creek, in Randolph County. Read the first time and passed.

On motion of Mr. Pickett, the following references were made of the various subjects embraced in the Governor's Message, viz;

So much as relates to Internal Improvements, to Messrs. Owen, Brodnax, Deberry, Williams of Martin and Beathune.

So much as relates to Marsh Lands, to Messrs. Speight of Greene, M'Eachin, Ward, Jones, and Askew of Hertford.

So much as relates to Public Education, to Messrs. Shober, Drake, Joiner, Franklin and Whitfield.

So much as relates to the Judiciary, to Messrs. Pickett, Bailey, Hinton, Lock, and Reinhardt.

So much as relates to procuring from the British Government, documents relating to our Colonial History, Messrs. Wilson of Edgecomb, Davidson, M'Millan, Montgomery and Ramsay.

So much as relates to the selling and surveying of the Lands lately acquired from the Cherokee Indians, &c. to Messrs. Spaight of Craven, Alexander, Love, Thompson and Williams, of Beaufort.

On motion of Mr. Owen, so much as relates to the alteration of the Tariff, contemplated by the 'Woolen's Bill' was referred to a joint select committee, consisting on the part of the Senate, of Messrs. Owen, Pickett, Speight of Greene, Spaight of Craven, and Brodnax. The House of Commons subsequently appointed on their part, Messrs. Settle, Eccles, Fisher, Blount and Wheeler.

Messrs. Burgin, Speight of Greene, Williams of Beaufort, Jones and Nuttall were named as a Committee on Military Affairs.

Mr. Burgin presented the petition of sundry inhabitants of Burke praying an alteration of the boundary line of the 1st Regiment. Referred to the Military Committee.

Friday, Nov. 23.

On motion of Mr. Pickett, the Judiciary Committee, were instructed to enquire into the expediency of increasing the official Bonds of the Clerks of the several Courts of Record, of this State, and also of amending the act of the General Assembly, providing for the deposit and safe keeping of said bonds.

On motion of Mr. Sherrard, the same Committee were instructed to enquire into the expediency of so amending the laws concerning Bastardy, as to give one Justice of the Peace competent jurisdiction.

Mr. Hinton introduced a resolution proposing to appoint Mr. Joseph Ross to take charge of the Public Buildings and keep them in a state of preservation, with a salary of 100 dollars attached to the office.

Mr. H. also presented the petition of Henry Gorman of this City, praying to be appointed to take charge of the Public Buildings—which Resolution and petition were referred to the Committee on the Public Buildings.

Messrs. Pickett, Askew of Bertie, Davenport Harrell and Beasley were appointed a Committee on the part of the Senate, to join the Committee on the Tucarora lands, named by the House.

Mr. Shober presented the petition of Christiana Cruttenden, praying that she may have secured to her, such property as she may hereafter acquire, and Mr. Dobson presented the petition of John Castepens of Surry, praying to be restored to credit. Read and referred.

Mr. Speight of Greene, presented a bill to repeal an act passed in 1823, concerning the Roanoke Navigation. Read the first time.

Saturday, Nov. 24, 1824.

The Message from the House of Commons, proposing to refer to a select joint committee, that part of the Governor's Message relating to the Cherokee Lands, was laid on the table, on motion of Mr. Pickett.

Mr. Shober, from the committee of Propositions and Grievances, to whom the petition of John Castepens, of Surry, was referred, reported a bill to restore him to credit, which was read the first and second time.

The bill to prevent the falling of timber in the run of Caraway creek, in Randolph, passed its second and third readings, and was ordered to be engrossed.

Mr. Deberry presented the petition of Elizabeth Culpepper, of Montgomery, Mr.

Bailey, the petition of John Salyear, of Washington, praying respectively for Divorces—which petitions were read and referred.

The resignation of J. W. Roper, Col. Commandant of the Regiment of Hyde county, was read and accepted.

On motion of Mr. Speight of Greene, the committee on Internal Improvements were instructed to enquire and report to the Senate, what progress has been made towards completing the navigation of the Roanoke, and into the practicability of completing the same by locking in, from the basin at Weldon's Orchard, with the probable expense of completing the same, and the practical good which would result to the State from effecting the same. The bill relating to the subject, introduced by Mr. Speight on yesterday, was referred to the same committee.

Mr. Montgomery presented a bill to vest the right of electing Sheriffs in the people, which was read the first time, ordered to be printed, and made the order of the day for Wednesday next, in committee of the whole.

HOUSE OF COMMONS.

Thursday, Nov. 22.

A message was received from the Senate, proposing a ballot to-morrow for a Treasurer of State, vice John Haywood deceased, and stating that John S. Haywood is in nomination for that appointment. This proposition was opposed, but after some debate was agreed to.

A message was sent to the Senate, proposing to refer to a select joint committee, so much of the Governor's message as relates to the Tuscarora lands, and naming for this purpose on the part of the House, Messrs. Hill, Stuart, White, Blackledge, and Montgomery.

A message was received from the Governor covering certain Resolutions from the States of Maine and Connecticut on the subject of Internal Improvements and a Communication from the State of Ohio, on the amendment of the Constitution of the United States. This message also contains a suggestion from the Governor, as to the propriety of reciprocating the civility of other States who have sent us a copy of their Laws, by transmitting to each a copy of ours. Laid on the table until to-morrow.

The House proceeded to the appointment of their Standing Committees, viz:

Of Privileges & Elections.—Messrs. Bateman, Tillet, Kilpatrick, Borden, Moore, M'Millan, Boon, Donoho, Jones, Williams, Baker, Conrad, Wilkinson, Cooper, Boykin and Wadsworth.

Of Propositions and Grievances.—Messrs. Barnard, Cherry, Hastings, Simmons, Stephens, Lewis, Glasgow, Sutton, Houch, Newland, Gold, Mann, Gary, Little and Hodges.

On Education.—Messrs. White, Ball, Whitfield, Blackledge, Gillespie, Gilmore, Taylor, N. Stedman, Morehead, Alexander, Gordon, Brittain, K. H. Jones, Ruffin, Marshall and Turrell.

Messrs. Spull, Blount, Moore, Scott, Troy, Mitchell, Spruill and Eccles form the Committee of Finance on the part of this House.

Two ballotings were had this day for Engrossing Clerks, but without an election.

Friday Nov. 23.

A message was received from the Senate, stating the vote of agreement to ballot this morning for Treasurer, had been reconsidered and negatived, and proposing to ballot for that office on Monday next.—Agreed to.

On motion of Mr. Jones of Warren, Resolved, That so much of the Governor's Message as relates to draining and reclaiming Marsh or Swamp Lands, be referred to the Committee on Internal Improvement. So much as relates to Public Instruction to the Committee on Education, and so much as relates to the Administration of Justice, to the Committee on the Judiciary and that they report by bill or otherwise.

On motion of Mr. Fisher, Resolved, That so much of said Message, as relates to a communication from the American Minister at London, be referred to a joint select Committee of three members, from each House, with instructions to enquire what measures this Legislature should take, consistent with considerations of just policy, towards the publication of a history of North Carolina: And that they report by bill or otherwise.

Messrs. Newland, Taylor, Brevard, Marshall and Montgomery, were appointed a Committee on Divorce and Alimony.

Messrs. Jones, of Warren, Morehead, Settle, Eccles, Spruill, Scott and Alexander were appointed a Committee on the Judiciary.

Messrs. Moore, Hill and Donoho, constitute the Library Committee on the part of this House.

A message from the Senate, proposing the appointment of a joint select Committee on the Public Buildings and naming on their part, Messrs. Speight of Greene, Hinton, Burgin, Vanhook and Love.—The proposition was acceded to, & Messrs. Lewis, Glisson, Gary, Bozman and Love, selected on the part of the House.

On motion of Mr. Brevard, Resolved, That the Judiciary Committee be instructed to enquire into the expediency of providing by law, for the final settlement of the accounts of Executors and Administrators in such manner as to secure to creditors, a just and equal proportion of their debts and demands, according to their respective amounts, out of the assets in the hands of such Executors or Administrators.

On motion of Mr. Alexander, Resolved, That the same Committee be instructed to enquire into the expediency of so amending the law, as to subject the assets in the hands of an Executor or Administrator to attachment.

Two ballotings were had for Engrossing Clerks, on the last of which, Wm. J. Cowan was elected. One yet remains to be elected.

Mr. Gold presented the petition of John Harcastle of Rutherford, praying to be

restored to credit & the petition of Charles Lewis of the same county, on the subject of a public Road. Mr. Clayton presented the petition of William Featherston of Buncombe, praying authority to open a practicable way to a public Mill. Mr. Salmon, the petition of John Powers of Stokes for Divorce. Mr. Allen, the petition of William Roberts of Buncombe for Divorce, and of Thomas Sharpe of the same county, praying to be placed on the Pension Roll. Mr. Neill, the petition of sundry citizens of Rutherford, praying for authority to alter the direction of a public Road. Which petitions were read and respectively referred.

The resignations of Reuben Walton, Lieut. Col. of Cavalry, in the 16th Brigade & of Sam'l. Mercer, Col. of the 2d Regiment of 1st Brigade of Infantry, were read and accepted.

Saturday, Nov. 24th.

The names of Jasper, Lilly, Covington, and Hodges having been withdrawn from the nomination for Engrossing Clerk, a balloting was had for the Clerk yet remaining to be chosen, which resulted in the election of Thomas Dewes.

Mr. Moore presented the Report of the Commissioners appointed under direction of an act of the last Legislature, to ascertain the practicability and probable expense of uniting the waters of Lockwood's Folly and Elizabeth river, by a Canal, which was referred to the committee on Internal Improvement.

Mr. Barnett presented the petition of Thomas Searcy, Clerk of the Superior Court of Rockingham, praying for the payment of the costs of a suit instituted in said Court by the Adjutant-General, against Genl. Bethell, in behalf of the State. Mr. Clayton, the petition of Jane Wilson, of Buncombe, and Mr. A. Williams, the petition of Phebe M'Knaughan, of Guilford, praying to have property secured to them from the claim of their husbands—which were read and respectively referred.

A message was sent to the Senate proposing to refer to a select joint committee, that part of the Executive Message relating to the Cherokee Lands, and informing that Messrs. Donoho, Allen of Buncombe, Allen of Montgomery, Jones of Rowan, and Bynum, form the committee on the part of the House.

On motion of Mr. Perry, the Committee on Education were instructed to enquire into the state of the Literary Fund, and make a report thereof as early as possible.

Mr. Neill presented the petition of Thomas Green, of Burke. Read and referred.

The resignations of B. Wilkinson, Lieut. Colonel of the second Regiment, and of W. R. Bullock, Major of the first Regiment of Edgecomb Militia, were read and accepted.

We are compelled from want of room, to omit the proceedings of the Administration Meetings, held in Carteret, Pasquotank, Camden and Beaufort counties.

At his residence in this city on the 18th inst. in the 73d year of his age, Jno. Haywood, Esq. Public Treasurer of the State. To the inhabitants of this State, who are acquainted with the official character of this gentleman, it is unnecessary to pronounce his eulogium; but justice requires that we should proclaim to the world, that North Carolina, in an age of defalcation, possessed a servant who for forty three years administered her Treasury with a virtue truly Roman; who, remarkable in private life for the amenity of his disposition, in the discharge of his public duties combined the firmness of Cato with the integrity of Fabricius.

We of North Carolina may with truth affirm his to be

Clarum et venerabile nomen, — et multum nostrae quod proderat urbi.

To the influence of his example we owe that elevated standard of official integrity, that sensibility to the sacredness of a public trust, which prevails among us, and which has rendered peculation unknown. In return we owe him a monument more durable than brass, which shall be forever present to our recollection, which can only be erected in our hearts.
