YALE COLLEGE.
There are forty one graduates of this
college now living, or supposed to be liv-
ing, who left the institution sixty years
ago and upwards. Including the above,
there are ninety-four persons now living,
who graduated at this College before the
Declaration of American Independence.
The University (for it cannot longer be
denied the dignity of that title,) in all its
departments, has set out on the present
year, under auspices peculiarly flattering;
with its usual alacrity in business, and a
tranquillity within and without, which
furnishes the best comment on the nature of
her constitution and laws.

The annual catalogue not being yet com-
pleted, we have it not in our power to
state what the precise number is to be.
But at present, we are told that the new
class amounts to 80—and the entire ac-
cession to the academical classes, not less
than 100; making the whole number of
under grauates about 335.

The theological department, under the
direction of the Rev. Dr. Taylor, assisted
by Professor Gibbs, has increased very
rapidly. It now embraces about 50 students
exclusive of several resident graduates.
We hope the Christian public will feel the
necessity of nourishing and supporting this
important branch of the Institution.

The Law School under the guidance of
the Hon. Judge Dargatz, and Samuel S.
Hitchcock, Esq. has commenced its course
of daily lectures and recitations with 22
members. Judge Dargatz it is said com-
mences his law lectures to the Senior Class
and Graduates of the College, in the en-
suing week.

The Medical College, which commenced
its lectures last week, enumerates already
ninety students. [Nat. Gaz.]

The barriers of the Constitution.—In a
speech delivered in the Tennessee Legis-
lature, on the resolution for impeaching the
President, a Mr. Aiken observed, among
other things, in reference to the election
of President, that "hitherto the voice of
the People has been heard in vain, and
their will defeated, and it is therefore
important that constitutional barriers
should be removed." Now, with all defer-
ence to this statesman, we think that the
barriers of the Constitution should be up-
held and defended, and it is mainly be-
cause we fear that the party to which Mr.
Aiken belongs, would be too apt to disre-
gard the barriers of the Constitution, and
that the brave and distinguished, but rash
and uncalculating citizen, whom that party
support for the Presidency, would him-
self disregard those very barriers, that we
deprecate and dread its success. Instead
of helping to pull them down, be it our
care, and that of every other man who de-
sires to live under a government of law, to
send and uphold them. [Nat. Int.]

During a late trial in Philadelphia, Mr.
Ingersoll related to the Jury an interesting
anecdote in reference to the late Col. Cad-
walader. A harmless maniac, that had
been for years suffered to pass as an in-
offensive idiot, one day took the mischief into
his head to load a gun with ball, and shoot
the first man he might meet in the street.
With his loaded musket he sallied out, and
it happened that Col. Cadwalader was the
first object that struck his sight. The
maniac went up to the Colonel, and sternly
demanded "What o'clock is it?" Col.
Cadwalader observing the singular state of
the maniac, flattered him by making a ve-
ry low bow, pulling out his watch, and re-
plying, with great affability, "just 12, sir."
The maniac said, "That man is too polite,
I won't shoot him?" and went his way.
The very next man he met, he leveled his
gun, and shot him dead upon the spot.

Mutiny and death.—On Thursday morn-
ing last, the 15th instant, an unpleasant
affair occurred on board of the ship Ho-
garth, which terminated in the death of one
of the parties. The ship was lying in the
stream ready to sail for Liverpool, with
all of the crew on board. As is customary,
orders were issued that none of the crew
should be permitted to go ashore, and no
boats suffered to board the vessel. The
seamen were in a very mutinous state,
heated by the intemperate use of ardent
spirits. Between the hours of 1 and 2
o'clock, a boat from the shore approached
the ship, and under some frivolous pre-
text a certain individual succeeded in
boarding her. This person enticed the
deceased John Shaw, an artful seaman,
to leave the vessel, aided by a portion
of the crew; three or four of whom seized
the second mate Mr. Wm. Betts, who, in
discharge of his duty, was resisting this
outrage. On the boat's leaving the vessel,
Mr. Betts repeatedly urged the said Shaw
and his companions to return, threatening

to fire into her if his orders were not obeyed; to these entreaties he received replies
of the most insulting and outrageous char-
acter, which induced him to fire a pistol
with which he was armed, hoping thereby
to procure the return of the boat, and not
intending to injure any individual. The
morning was so dark and hazy that the
persons in the boat could not be distin-
guished, and unfortunately the ball struck
John Shaw, the artful seaman, who had
deserted, and caused his death. This
matter has since been investigated before
the proper tribunal, and it appearing that
Mr. Betts acted in the discharge of his duty
in quelling a mutiny, and did not intend
to injure any person, but only compel the
return of the boat with the deserting sea-
man, his Honor the presiding Judge dis-
charged Mr. Betts on his recognizance.

Importance of Types.—The New York
Gazette says—"A Lady living with Mr.
Joseph Caton, on Taylor's Island, near
Baltimore, killed, on the 11th, forty-eight
wild ducks at a single shot!" Here is a ter-
rible attack upon a lady, of which we could
never have thought the grave Editors of the
New York Gazette would have been guilty.
It is bad enough to tell such a story of a
delicate female, making her out a complete
tomboy and amazon. [Had it been beau-
tiful, instead of ducks, that she had shot, it
would have altered the case.] But not
content with this statement, so derogatory
to the lady's character, she is at once put
out of all respectable society, by the further
unequivocally epigrammatic expression that
she was a lady living with Mr. Joseph Caton!
Thus bringing the reputation of Mr. Jo-
seph Caton into discredit; and, perhaps,
creating a serious difficulty in his domestic
relations. All the mischief has been done
simply by a little redundant y, without
which it would have read LADY, instead of

A young lady of Williamstown, ac-
cidentally swallowed a pin which lodged
about half way down in its passage to the
stomach. Many expedients were adopted
by kind hearted friends, such as swallowing
hard substances, &c. and emetics were also
administered, but all to no purpose.
About ten hours after the accident, Doct.
Emmons of that town was called in, and the
remedy he applied, though simple, may
be of use in similar cases. A common
wire was used, about 12 inches and a half
long, and doubled, with a piece of sponge,
attached to the end; this in a dry state
was easily passed down the passage below
the pin, where it absorbed moisture and
became so much swollen that in drawing
it up it completely filled the *oesophagus*,
and brought up the pin attached to it.
