Railways -It is anticipated that the Liverpool and Manchester Railway will be completed in less than two years from the present time. The work is now proceding with great rapidity. We say to the people of North-Carolina, go and do likewise. A London paper thus describes what has been already done :'

Liverpool, at a point in direct communication, with the King's and Queen's Docks. The Line passes under the town of Liverpool by a Tunnel and inclined plane. This magnificent archway, sixteen feet high and twenty-two feet wide, is cut through the solid rock for the enormous length of 2248 vards, the inclined plane rising one foot in forty-nine. The steep ascent of Liverpool is thus avoided, and all interference with the general business of the street is thus effectually prevented. The excavations of this stupendous work have been go ing on at several points at the same time ; and the precision with which the junctionof the different parts have been effected in cases not varying two inches, offers a most remarkable example of the certain y of scientific arrangement. The road through the Chesterfield, from the latter county.) tunnel which we thus see is about a mile and a quarter long, comes into day-light at the top of the high hill (Eege hill) looking down upon Liverpool.
