### Laws of the United States.

An Act to provide for the purchase and distribu-  
tion of certain copies of the Digest of the  
Laws of the United States, by Thomas F.  
Gordon.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House  
of Representatives of the United States of  
America in Congress assembled, That the  
Secretary of the Department of State do  
and he is hereby authorized to purchase  
for the United States, five hundred copies  
of the Digest of the Laws of the United  
States, compiled by Thomas F. Gordon,  
at the price of six dollars per copy, bound  
in calfskin; and cause the same to be dis-  
tributed as follows: one copy thereof to  
the President of the United States, one  
copy to the Vice President of the United  
States, one copy to each of the Heads of  
Departments, to the Attorney General  
of the United States, to each of the Sena-  
tors and Representatives, and to each De-  
legate of Territories of the Twentieth Con-  
gress; fifteen copies to the Secretary of  
the Senate, for the use of the Senate; thirty  
copies to the Clerk of the House of  
Representatives, for the use of the House;  
one copy to each branch of the Legislature  
of each State and Territory; one copy to  
each of the Executives of the several  
States and Territories; and one copy to  
each incorporated College in the United  
States; and one copy to each Justice of  
the Supreme Court; one copy to each  
District Judge, and one copy to each Judge  
of the Courts of the Territories of the United  
States, and of the District of Columbia;  
and cause the residue to be deposited  
in the Library of Congress.

Sec. 2. And be it further enacted, That  
there shall be appropriated, and paid out  
of any moneys in the Treasury, unappropri-  
ated, the sum of three thousand dollars,  
for the completion of the said purchase.

Approved 24th February, 1829.

An Act to alter the time of holding the Sixth  
Circuit Court of the United States for the Dis-  
trict of South-Carolina.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House  
of Representatives of the United States of  
America in Congress assembled, That the  
Sixth Circuit Court of the United States,  
for the District of South-Carolina, which  
is required by law to be held on the second  
Monday in December, annually, shall  
hereafter be held on the fourth Monday  
in November, annually; and that all pro-  
ceedings which shall have been issued, and all  
recognizances returnable, and all suits and  
other proceedings, which have been con-  
tinued to the said Court, on the day here-  
tofore provided by law for the meeting of  
the same, shall be returned and held con-  
tinued to the said Court at the time here-  
in provided for the meeting thereof.

Approved—24th February, 1829.

An Act to authorize the appointment of a Sur-  
veyor for the Virginia Military District within  
the State of Ohio.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House  
of Representatives of the United States of  
America in Congress assembled, That there  
shall be appointed by the President of the  
United States, by and with the advice and  
consent of the Senate, a Surveyor for the  
Virginia Military District within the State  
of Ohio, who shall keep his office at Chillicothe,  
within the said District, within the State  
of Ohio, until otherwise directed by law.

Sec. 2. And be it further enacted, That  
the Surveyor appointed by virtue of this act  
shall possess the same powers and authori-  
ty, perform the same duties, receive the  
same emoluments, and, in all respects, be  
subject to, and regulated by, the same  
laws, rules, and regulations, which were  
received, exercised and performed by, and  
governed the late Surveyor of said District,  
so far as the Virginia Military District in  
the State of Ohio is concerned.

Sec. 3. And be it further enacted, That  
it shall be the duty of the Surveyor to be  
appointed under the authority of this act  
to receive from the personal representa-  
tives of Colonel Richard C. Anderson, de-  
ceased, late Surveyor of said Districts, all  
the original books, records, warrants,  
plats and certificates of surveys, assign-  
ments, and other papers, relating exclu-  
sively to lands already surveyed, surveyed,  
or patented, or in the survey, entered

and patented, within the Virginia Military  
District in the State of Ohio; and he shall  
also make, or cause to be made, so far as re-  
lates to claims to land in said Virginia  
Military District in the State of Ohio, fair  
copies of such original books, records, war-  
rants, plats and certificates of surveys, as-  
signments, and other papers, from such  
original books, records, and papers, in said  
office, [which contain entries, certificates,  
surveys, plats, assignments, or other pa-  
pers or evidences of title, in which is also  
included entries, certificates, surveys,  
plats, assignments, or other evidences of  
title, pertaining to lands lying within  
the Virginia Military District in the  
State of Kentucky,] which transcripts and  
copies he shall carefully preserve as a part  
of the records of his office, and from which  
he may give copies, as from the originals,  
to be used in all cases of controversies in  
the Courts of the United States, about  
lands in the said District, in the State of  
Ohio.

Sec. 4. And be it further enacted, That  
it shall and may be lawful for the personal  
representatives of the said Richard C. An-  
derson, before the delivery of the books, re-  
cords, papers, and copies, herein specified,  
to require of the Surveyor appointed un-  
der the provisions of this act, bond with  
good and sufficient security, to be ap-  
proved of by the County Court of Jefferson,  
in the State of Kentucky, if not approved of  
by the personal representatives of said Ri-  
chard C. Anderson, in the penal sum of  
ten thousand dollars, conditioned that the  
said Surveyor shall pay over to the said  
Anderson's personal representatives all  
such sums of money due, or to become due,  
to said Anderson, or his representatives,  
for fees due, services performed, or busi-  
ness done by said Anderson, as late Sur-  
veyor in said office, and which may be re-  
ceived by the said Surveyor appointed un-  
der this act; and conditioned, also, that he will not  
surrender to any person or persons original  
copies of any of the records, books,  
warrants, plats and certificates of  
survey, assignments, or other papers, by  
him received of the personal representa-  
tives of said Richard C. Anderson, upon  
which fees are due, to the person or per-  
sons claiming interest on the same, or any  
other person whatever, until the fees due,  
or to become due, to said Anderson, or his  
legal representatives, shall have been first  
paid to said Surveyor; and upon the execu-  
tion of said bond, the personal representa-  
tives of said Anderson are authorized and  
required to deliver the records, books, cop-  
ies and papers, herein above specified, as  
is provided by this act.

Sec. 5. And be it further enacted, That  
it shall be the duty of the Surveyor for  
said Virginia Military District, before he  
shall receive any location or entry of mili-  
tary warrants to be surveyed, to give at  
least sixty days notice, in those newspa-  
pers in which the laws of the United States  
are published in Ohio, of the day on which  
he will begin to receive such locations or  
entries, the expenses of which notice shall  
be audited and paid by the Treasury De-  
partment of the United States.

Approved 24th February, 1829.

### PERFORMANCES.

Washington, in 1822, when he was 3 years old,  
was engaged in four Sweepstakes; in the Spring  
he won the Stakes at New-Market & Lawrence-  
ville; in the Fall he was beaten at Warrenton,  
by John Richards; he won the 1st heat, but lost the  
2d, by having a bad start, whereby he lost  
about eighty yards, and was only beaten half a  
length. Being considered in bad order he was  
drawn, having the sweepstakes at New-Market  
to run for, when he won, beating the celebra-  
ted race horse Henry (the same that ran against  
Eclipse for twenty thousand dollars) there were  
four heats in this race, the first being a dead  
heat; Henry won the second, Washington the  
3d and 4th.

In the Spring of 1823, he was trained at New-  
Market, but owing to his having a curb on one  
of his legs, the first of the training season, he  
only run one race. He was handy-capped at  
New-Market with Sir William and a horse be-  
longing to Col. Wynne. Washington won the  
first heat, Sir William the second and third,  
Washington was unfortunate in this race; he  
lost considerably in starting for the second heat,  
and was only beaten a length. This heat was  
run in three minutes forty-five seconds, which is  
two seconds less than any two mile heat has  
ever been run at New-Market. Sir William had  
ten pounds off his regular weight, and Washing-  
ton carried his full weight.

The following Fall he won the Proprietor's  
Purse at New-Market, three hundred dollars,  
three mile heats. The first heat in this race  
was also run in two seconds less than any on re-  
cord on that ground.

He was then carried to Baltimore, where he  
won the Proprietor's Purse of five hundred dol-  
lars, beating the celebrated race horse Flying  
Childers with ease. He was discovered to be  
lame after this race, occasioned as was sup-  
posed by the situation of the ground, it being a  
new tract.

He was then carried to Washington City, and  
ran one heat in that situation, but was beaten by  
a mare of Mr. Wynn's, and was drawn. He was  
trained the Spring following, and won the Jock-  
ey Club Purse four mile heats, at New-Market,  
six hundred dollars, with ease, beating Colonel  
Wynn's mare Plutilla, & Capt. Harrison's horse  
Aratus.
