University of Virginia.
THE next session will begin on the 10th September, and continue till the 20th of July following.

The Institution is conveyed partly by lectures and partly by the study of approved text books, and in all cases the assiduity of the student is tested by a rigid system of examination.
Every student, under the age of 21 years, is required to attend at least three Professors, or two Professors and the Demonstrator of Anatomy and Surgery, unless when he matriculates, his parent or guardian shall have prescribed, in writing, the schools which he is required to attend, or unless the Faculty for good cause shown shall allow him to attend less than three.

Monthly circulars are written to the parents and guardians stating the attendance of each student at lecture, and exhibiting the student's proficiency and deportment.

To be admitted, the student must be sixteen years of age; he is required to wear a uniform dress, the particulars of which are detailed in the enactments. This rule will be rigidly enforced—the prescribed uniform will have to be worn on all occasions, both within and without the precincts, when the student appears out of his room, except, that in warm weather, he may wear such light gown or coat within the precincts, as the Chairman may approve. The attention of parents and guardians is particularly drawn to this enactment, in order that their sons or wards may not be provided with clothes which cannot be permitted to be worn.

Students entering the University after the commencement of the Session, shall pay board only for the time unexpired at the yearly rate. They shall pay the full fees and reside at whatever time they may enter.

For the Medical School one full course at the University is considered by the authorities of the University of Pennsylvania as equal to one course here.

PROCLAMATION.

By the Governor of North-Carolina.

Two Hundred Dollars Reward.

WHEREAS it has been made known to me, that a Murder has been committed in the Town of Oxford, in the County of Granville and State of North-Carolina, on the 4th day of November last, and that a certain THOMAS MITCHELL, late of the County and State aforesaid, stands charged by the finding of a Grand Jury, on a bill of indictment, with having perpetrated the same on the body of a certain Shelton Hobgood, of said County—And as it is further represented and made known to me, that the said THOMAS MITCHELL hath absconded and fled from the jurisdiction and limits of this State, and thereby eluded the arm of the law and of justice:

Now therefore, to the end that the said THOMAS MITCHELL may be apprehended and brought to justice, the above reward of TWO HUNDRED DOLLARS will be given to any person or persons who will apprehend and confine the said Thomas Mitchell in any Jail in this State, so that he may be brought to justice.—And I do, moreover, hereby require, command and enjoin, all officers whatsoever, as well civil as military, within this State, to use their best endeavors so apprehend and take, or cause to be apprehended and taken, the body of the said Thomas Mitchell, and him safely and securely keep, so that he shall be brought to justice.

THOMAS MITCHELL is about 19 years of age, of slender form, down look, a little freckled, round shoulders and hazel eyes—was lately seen by a gentleman of Granville County at New Orleans, where probably he now is.

IN TESTIMONY WHEREOF, I have caused the Great Seal of the State to be hereunto affixed, and subscribed the same officially, at the City of Raleigh, on the 20th day of June, A. D. 1829.

Navy Beef and Pork for 1830.

NAVY COMMISSIONERS' OFFICE.

17th June, 1829.

SEALED Proposals will be received at this Office until the first of September next, for the supply of 3000 blbs. Navy Beef, & 2400 blbs. Navy Pork for the use of the United States Naval Service, 1000 blbs. of Beef, & 800 blbs. of Pork to be delivered at each of the U. States Navy Yards, Charlestown, Mass.; Brooklyn, New-York; and Norfolk, Virginia; and the whole quantity must be delivered at each & every Navy Yard by the first of April, 1830. The whole quantity of the said Beef & Pork must be of the best quality. The Beef must be packed from well fattened cattle, weighing not less than 430 pounds in the quarter, or 800 pounds on the hoof; all the legs, feet, skulls, &c., must be wholly excluded from the barrel, and the remainder of the carcass must be cut into pieces of ten pounds each as near as may be, so that twenty pieces will make a barrel of 200 pounds nett weight of Navy Beef.

The Pork must be corn-fed and well-fatted all the skulls, feet, and hind legs entire, must be wholly excluded from the barrel, and the remainder of the Hog must be cut into pieces of eight pounds each as near as may be, so that twenty-five pieces, not more than three of which shall be shoulders, will make a barrel of 200 pounds nett weight of Navy Pork.

The whole quantity of the said Beef and Pork must be perfectly salted in the first instance with, and afterwards packed with a sufficient quantity of Turck's Island, Isle of May, or St. Ubes Salt, and no other, to ensure its preservation, with five ounces of pure Saltpetre, to each and every barrel. The barrels in which the said Beef and Pork is to be packed must be made of the best seasoned heart of white oak or white ash, free from sap, with one iron hoop on each chime, and otherwise fully and substantially hooped; and each barrel must be branded on its head "Navy Beef," or "Navy Pork," with the contractor's name and the year when packed.

All the said Beef and Pork, on delivery at the respective Navy Yards, must be subjected to the test and inspection of some sworn Inspector of the State within which it is to be delivered, who shall be selected by the Commandant of the Navy Yard at the place of delivery, without any charge to the United States therefor; and when inspected in said manner, the contractor must put the barrels in good shipping order, or the Beef and Pork will not be received.

Bidders are required to state their prices separately for the Beef and for the Pork, and if they offer to furnish at more than one Yard, then separately for each Yard. They are also required to give their names, their residence, and the names and residence of their sureties, minutely; and must transmit their bids sealed, and endorsed "Offer to furnish 'Navy Beef' or 'Navy Pork' for the year 1830."

The Commissioners of the Navy are at liberty to take the offers of a bidder for any one Yard, or for the articles deliverable at any one Yard, or in greater proportions, if such bids be the lowest.

Any bid not made in conformity to this advertisement, or not received within the limited time, will not be opened.

The parts of the animal to be excluded from the barrel will be particularly described in drawings which will form part of the contract.—Persons desiring information upon the subject with an intention to bid, may obtain it by seasonable application to the Board.
