By the Governor of North-Carolina. Two Hundred Dollars Reward.

WHEREAS it has been made known to me, that a Murder has been committed in the Town of Oxford, in the County of Granville and State of North-Carolina, on the 4th day of November last, and that a certain THOMAS MIT-CHELL, late of the County and State aforesaid tands charged by the finding of a Grand Jury on a bill of Indictment, with having perpetrated the same on the body of a certain Shel ton Hobgood, of said County :-- And, as it is further represented and made known to me, that the said THOMAS MITCHELL hath ab sconded and fled from the jurisdiction and limts of this State, and thereby eluded the arm o
