PROCLAMATION.

By the Governor of North-Carolina.
Two Hundred Dollars Reward.

WHEREAS it has been made known to me, that a Murder has been committed in the Town of Oxford, in the County of Granville and State of North-Carolina, on the 4th day of November last, and that a certain **THOMAS MITCHELL**, late of the County and State aforesaid, was charged by the finding of a Grand Jury, on a bill of indictment, with having perpetrated the same on the body of a certain Shelton Hobgood, of said County:—And, as it is further represented and made known to me, that the said THOMAS MITCHELL hath absconded and fled from the jurisdiction and limits of this State, and thereby eluded the arm of the law and of justice:

Now therefore, to the end that the said THOMAS MITCHELL may be apprehended and brought to justice, the above reward of TWO HUNDRED DOLLARS will be given to any person or persons who will apprehend and confine the said Thomas Mitchell in any Jail in this State, so that he may be brought to justice—And I do, moreover, hereby require, command and enjoin, all officers whatsoever, as well civil as military, within this State, to use their best endeavors so apprehend and take, or cause to be apprehended and taken, the body of the said Thomas Mitchell, and him safely and securely keep, so that he shall be brought to justice. THOMAS MITCHELL is about 19 years of age, of slender form, down look, a little freckled, round shoulders and hazel eyes—was lately seen by a gentleman of Granville County at New Orleans, where probably he now is.
