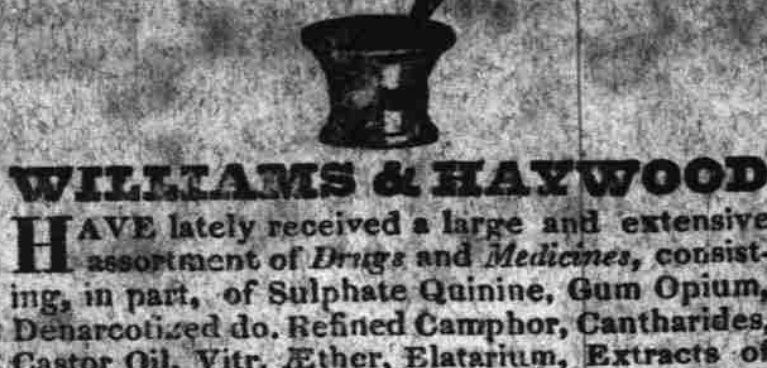

PROCLAMATION. By the Governor of North-Carolina. Two Hundred Dollars Reward.

WHEREAS it has been made known to me, that a Murder has been committed in the Town of Oxford, in the County of Granville and State of North-Carolina, on the 4th day of November last, and that a certain THOMAS MITCHELL, late of the County and State aforesaid, charged by the finding of a Grand Jury, on a bill of Indictment, with having perpetrated the same on the body of a certain Shelton Hobgood, of said County:—And, as it is further represented and made known to me, that the said THOMAS MITCHELL hath absconded and fled from the jurisdiction and limits of this State, and thereby eluded the arm of the law and of justice:

IN TESTIMONY WHEREOF, I have caused the Great Seal of the State to be hereunto affixed, and subscribed the same officially, at the City of Raleigh, on the 20th day of June, A. D. 1829.
