Tappearing to the satisfaction of the Court that John Vestal, one of the defendants in his case, is not an inhabitant of this State; it is herefore ordered, that notice be published in he Huleigh Register for six months of the filing of the Petition, and that the said John Vestal, at he next term of this Court, on the 3d Monday of March next, plead, answer or demur to the settion, or the same will be taken pro confesse and heard exparte.
