MONTBEL.

Soon after receiving the papers by the Charlemagne, we received our files of London and Liverpool papers, brought by the packet ship William Thompson, the former of the 15th, the latter of the 16th inclusive. The London dates via Paris are two days later.

IRELAND. --- The revenue of the Irish Church is to form a part of the business of the next session of the British Parliament, with a view to its more equal distribution. The plan of reform will be in substance what has been already put forth by Lord Montcashel in his correspondence with the Bishop of Ferns, and will undoubtedly re ceive the support of those sincere Protestants who believe the main strength of the Church to consist in the purity of her doctrines, and who see the danger of obstinately refusing alterations, which the temper of the fimes imperatively call fur.-Such a step may carry partial relief to a few but some stronger measure must be adopted before Ireland becomes a happy country, and her peasantry placed in a condition in which' they can obtain by their own ndustry the common wants of life.


