

STATE LEGISLATURE.

SENATE.

Saturday, Dec. 26.

Mr. McFarland presented the petition of Elijah Thomas and others from Richmond county, praying to be incorporated into a Company for the purpose of rearing Sheep and growing Wool.

Mr. Davidson presented a bill to authorize the Public Treasurer to issue Treasury Notes.

Mr. Hinton of Beaufort, a bill concerning the Washington Toll Bridge.

On motion of Mr. Allen, the Senate proceeded to the consideration of the bill to erect out of a part of the counties of Burke and Buncombe, a separate and distinct District.

The bill more effectually to prevent the depredation of Runaway slaves and to encourage their apprehension in the county of Lenoir.

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Monday, Dec. 28.

Mr. Wellborn presented a bill to prevent protracted and vexatious litigation by enlarging the jurisdiction of Justices of the Peace.

Mr. Hinton of Wake, a bill to alter the times of holding the Superior Court of Law and Equity in the third Judicial Circuit.

Mr. Allen, a bill for the encouragement of Newton Academy in the County of Buncombe.

Mr. Sneed, from the Committee of Finance, reported a bill concerning the bonds in the office of the Public Treasurers.

Mr. Meares, from the Judiciary Committee, reported a bill vesting certain powers in the County Courts of Edgecomb.

Mr. Meares, from the same Committee reported a bill more effectually to prevent the depredations of runaway slaves.

The bill authorizing Joseph Loftin, late Sheriff of Lenoir county, to collect arrears of taxes.

Mr. Martin from the Committee of Claims, reported a resolution in favor of Thomas Walker of Mecklenburg.

Mr. Ward from the committee appointed on that part of the Governor's Message, relating to the Militia and Public Arms.

Mr. Cowper presented a Resolution which was rejected, proposing to extend the time now allowed by law, for the collection of arrears of taxes.

The Senate resolved itself into a committee of the whole, Mr. Wilson in the chair, on the bill fixing the fees of Clerks, and Sheriffs.

Mr. Hinton of Wake, announced the death of Reuben Sanders, the Senator from the county of Johnston.

Resolved, That the Members of this Legislature, will wear crapes on their left arm, for the space of thirty days.

On motion of Mr. Spaight, the Senate immediately adjourned.

Tuesday, Dec. 29.

Mr. Rainey presented a bill requiring Registers and Clerks to keep their offices at Court-houses.

Mr. McDiarmid, a bill securing the collection of fines and amercements from Sheriffs in this State.

The resignation of Alfred Kornegay Lieutenant Colonel of Sampson Militia, was read and accepted.

Mr. Sued from the committee of Finance, reported a bill to provide for the collection of a Judgment obtained against certain devisees of the late John Haywood.

The Senate again went into a committee of the whole, on the bill fixing the fees of the Clerks and Sheriffs.

The bill to authorize Henry S. Spencer, Sheriff of Hyde county to collect arrears of taxes, was rejected on its second reading.

The bill to authorize John V. Sumner, late Sheriff of Gates to collect arrears of taxes, was read the second time and postponed indefinitely.

The following engrossed bills passed their second and third readings and were ordered to be enrolled.

The bill to authorize James S. Clarke, late Sheriff of Pitt to collect certain arrears of taxes.

The bill more effectually to prevent the depredation of Runaway slaves and to encourage their apprehension in the county of Lenoir.

The Resolution in favor of Ransom Hinton was read the third time and ordered to be engrossed.

HOUSE OF COMMONS.

Saturday, Dec. 26.

Mr. Smith of Chatham, presented a bill to amend an act passed in 1828, to amend the law regulating the inspection of Flour in the town of Fayetteville.

Mr. Polk, from the Military Committee, made an unfavorable report on the memorial of a number of the citizens of Montgomery county.

The bill to alter the times of holding the Superior Courts of Law and Equity in the 3d Judicial Circuit.

Mr. Graham presented the petition of sundry citizens of Rutherford, on the subject of a Turnpike Road.

The resignation of Marsden Campbell, a Member of the Board of Internal Improvements, was read and accepted.

The Engrossed bills concerning the appointment of Commissioners for the county of Franklin and town of Louisburg.

Mr. Cox presented the petition of sundry citizens of Jones county, on the subject of runaway slaves.

Mr. Carson presented a bill to amend an act passed in 1827, allowing further time for the registration of Grants, proving and registering Mesne Conveyances.

Mr. Edmonston presented a bill to authorize the appointment of Commissioners to run and mark the dividing line between the counties of Haywood and Buncombe.

Mr. Webb, a bill to compel Executors and Testamentary Guardians to give security.

Mr. Mendenhall, from the Committee of Claims made an unfavorable report on the petition of Jacob Hartman of Wilmington.

Mr. Cox presented the petition of sundry citizens of Jones county, on the subject of runaway slaves.

Mr. Carson presented a bill to amend an act passed in 1827, allowing further time for the registration of Grants.

The act making an appropriation for repairing and fitting out the frigate Brandywine, was received from the House of Representatives.

Evening Session.

Mr. Stanly presented a bill to improve the navigation of the Trent River above the Town of Trenton.

The Engrossed bill concerning the County Courts of Martin passed its third reading and was ordered to be enrolled.

The bill to provide for the better organization of the County Courts of Rutherford, was read the second time and rejected.

The engrossed bill to repeal part of an act passed at last session, compelling certain officers of Chatham county to keep their offices at Pittsborough.

The bill to authorize Samuel H. Jenkins of Edgecomb county to collect arrears of taxes.

The bill to amend an act passed in 1818, to elect a Magistrate for the town of Wilmington.

The bill for the relief Presley C. Person, Sheriff of Franklin, were severally read the time and rejected.

Monday, Dec. 28.

Mr. Nash submitted a Resolution, directing the Secretary of State, to purchase a sufficient number of Taylor's Revision of the Laws of this State.

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Mr. Moon, from the committee of Propositions and Grievances made an unfavorable Report on the petition of Leonard Hise of Burke.

Mr. Moon submitted a Resolution, to amend the laws imposing lay days on the fisheries of Roanoke, Albemarle and their waters.

Mr. Pearson presented a bill to amend an act passed at last session, to amend the law with respect to the collection of debts from the estate of deceased persons.

The House reconsidered the vote of rejection, on the bill to repeal part of an act passed last session compelling certain officers of Chatham county to keep their offices at Pittsborough.

Mr. Monk presented a bill to repeal part of an act passed in 1828, for improving the navigation of creeks and Rivers in Sampson county.

Mr. Hancock, a bill to compel the county officers of Moore county, to keep their offices at the Court-house.

A message was received from the Senate announcing the death of Reuben Sanders, a member of that body.

Tuesday, Dec. 29.

Mr. Mendenhall from the committee of claims reported a resolution in favor of Edward Ward of Onslow, which was read and ordered to be engrossed.

Mr. M. from the same committee, to whom was referred a resolution in favor of David Marsburn of Burke.

The bill prescribing the sum hereafter to be paid for retailing spirituous liquors, was indefinitely postponed.

The bill to enable the Public Treasurer to employ the service of additional Clerks, was read the third time and passed.

A communication was received from Governor Owen, covering the Annual Report of the Board of Trustees of the University.

A balloting took place for Cavalry officers attached to the 11th brigade.

The engrossed bill for the better regulation of the town of Washington was read the second and third time and ordered to be enrolled.

Mr. Moon presented a bill authorizing the sheriff of Bertie to collect the arrearages of taxes due for 1826 and 1827.

CONGRESS.

IN SENATE.

Wednesday, Dec. 23.

The Bill providing for the allowance of interest to certain States therein mentioned, on such advances made by them to the United States during the late war.

Thursday, Dec. 24.

Mr. Marks presented a resolution of the Legislature of Pennsylvania, instructing the delegation from that State in Congress, to use all constitutional means to procure for the American Colonization Society the aid and support of the National Government.

The act making an appropriation for repairing and fitting out the frigate Brandywine, was received from the House of Representatives.

HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES.

Wednesday Dec 23.

On motion of Mr. Dwight, it was Resolved, That the committee on the Census be instructed to enquire into the expediency of making provision by law, for collecting statistical information.

On motion of Mr. Dwight, it was Resolved, That the committee on the Judiciary be instructed to enquire into the expediency of increasing the allowance for travel and attendance of the Jurors of the Circuit and District Courts of the United States.

On Motion of Mr. Bates, it was Resolved, That the committee on Military affairs be instructed to enquire into the expediency of increasing the Salary of the Master Armors of the United States.

Mr. Richardson moved the following Resolution, which was read and ordered to lie on the table.

Resolved, That a Select committee be appointed to consider the expediency of appropriating a portion of the Revenue of the United States to purposes of Education.

On motion of Mr. Cahoon, it was Resolved, That the committee on the Militia be instructed to enquire into the expediency of so altering the Militia laws as to exempt from military duty in time of peace, all persons under 21 and over 35 years of age.

On motion of Mr. McDuffie, the House resolved itself into a committee of the

Whole on the state of the Union, (Mr. Martin, of South Carolina, being called to the chair) and took up the bill reported by the committee of Ways and Means for making an appropriation for fitting out the frigate Brandywine.

On the question of ordering the bill to be engrossed for a third reading.

Mr. McDuffie (Chairman of the committee of Ways and Means) briefly stated the necessity for this appropriation. The fact was known to every member of the House, that the commerce of the United States in the Gulf of Mexico and with South America was subject to piratical depredations.

Resolved, That a select committee be appointed to enquire into the expediency of establishing a branch of the United States Mint in the Gold region of North-Carolina.

The resolution being read, the question was put, Will the House agree thereto? and decided in the negative.

On motion of Mr. Pettis, it was Resolved, That the committee on the Public Lands be instructed to enquire into the expediency of providing by law for the graduation of the price of the public lands.

The House then adjourned until Monday next.

LATEST FROM EUROPE.

NEW-YORK, Dec. 19.

At a late hour yesterday we received Paris papers to the 20th ult. inclusive, by the Charlemagne. A change has taken place in the French Ministry.

Soon after receiving the papers by the Charlemagne, we received our files of London and Liverpool papers, brought by the packet ship William Thompson.

IRELAND.—The revenue of the Irish Church is to form a part of the business of the next session of the British Parliament.
