more whispered, regarding the ill-treatment which General Harrison, late Minister of the United States to Columbia, is said to have received, during the latter part of his letter upon this subject, a few weeks since. By that letter we were informed that Gen. considered rather popular with the cabinet,

we do not know. Gen. Harrison has had a very difficult and delicate task to perform at Bogota. -He found almost immediately after his arrival, that but little friendship was felt for the United States, by Bolivar and his par

ty. While he was caressed and flattered by the foreign officers by whom he was sur ounded-and while the diplomatic agents or other governments were encouraging him to assume the purple, the weight and influence of the U. States, under the administrations of Mr. Monroe and Mr. A. dams, was thrown into the scale of freedom. Party spirit can very high at the time of Gen. It's arrival, and it was soon apparent that the friends of Bolivar eyed him askance, as the necessary enemy of the ambitious views of their master, while, on the other hand, the republican party looked upon him as their friend. Still it was his dury, and a duty which he most scrupolously discharged, to know no party, and attend exclusively to his official duties, ad the interests of his own connury .--But the numerous wrongs inflicted upo American citizens by the Bolivian authorities-wrongs which it was his duty to see redressed-brought him often in collision with the government. Nevertheless he was treated with every possible degree of respect & courtesy, so long as he remained in the discharge of his official duties. But or different was the fact, immediately af ter Gen. H. had presented Mr. Moore, as his successor, to the Council of State, and taken his audience of leave.
