PROCLAMATION.

By the Governor of North-Carolina. Two Hundred Dollars Reward! WHEREAS it has been made known to me, that a Murder has been committed in the County of Caswell, and State of North-Carolina, on the 12th day of April last, and that a certain CHARLES WILSON, of the County and State aforesaid, stands charged by the verdict of a Governor's Inquest, with having perpetrated the same on the body of one John Morris, late of the Commonwealth of Virginia; and as it is further represented and made known unto me, that the said Charles Wilson hath absconded and fled from the jurisdiction and limits of this State, and thereby eluded the arm of the law and justice.

Now, therefore, to the end, that the said Charles Wilson may be apprehended & brought to trial, the above reward of \$200 will be given to any person or persons who will apprehend and confine him in any Jail in this State, that he may be brought to answer the offence with which he here stands charged.

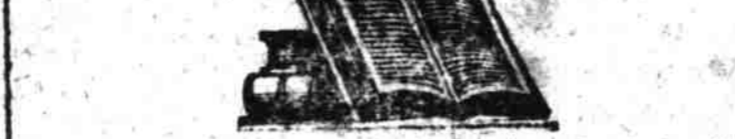
