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NEWSPAPER STATISTICS.

The first press in North America, was set up in 1639, by Stephen Day at Cambridge Mass.

In 1687, printing was begun near Philadelphia, by Wm Bradford.

The Boston News Letter, a weekly paper, was the first newspaper printed in the United States. It was published at Boston by Bartholomew Green, in the year 1704.

On the 22d December 1719, the first number of the American Weekly Mercury was published at Philadelphia by Andrew Bradford.

In 1721, the New England Courant was begun at Boston, by James Franklin, the brother of Dr. Franklin. This was the fourth paper published in North America.

In 1725, the New York Gazette was established in the city of New-York by William Bradford.

In 1725, the first printing was done in Virginia by William Parks.

In 1728, the Universal Instructor in all Arts and Sciences, and Pennsylvania's Gazette, was printed at Philadelphia being the second paper in this state. It survived until 1825, or 1774, and was then the oldest paper in the Union.

In 1730, Thomas Whitmarsh published a newspaper at Charleston, being the first in either of the Carolinas.

In November, 1733, the first number of the New-York Weekly Journal, was published by John Peter Zenger. It was encouraged by the citizens of New-York, as a medium through which they might publish strictures on the government.
