The constant roar of the cannon is so distressing, that we cannot eat, drink, or sleep. May we be supported and sustained in the dreadful conflict ! I shall tarry here until it is thought unsafe by my friends, and then I have myself secured a retreat at your brother's, who has kindly offered me a part of his house. I cannot compose myself to write at present. I will add more as I hear further.

TUESDAY AFTERNOON.

I have been so much agitated that I have not been able to write since Sabbath day .---When I say ten thousand reports are passing, vague, and uncertain as the wind, I believe I speak the truth. I am not able to give you any authentic account of last Saturday, but you will not be destitute of intelligence .---Col. Palmer has just sent me word that he has an opportunity of conveyance. Incordently pray that you may be supported through the arduous task you have before you. I wish I could contradict the report of the Doctor's death ; but it is a lamentable truth, and the tears of multitudes pay tribute to his memory ; those favorite lines of Collins continually sound in my ears,

"How sleep the brave," &c.
