WHEREAS, it has been made appear to the Executive Department, that, at the last Term of the Superior Court of the County of Cabarrus, the Grand Jury found a true Bill against MARK KISOR, for the murder of James B. Russell; and that said Kisor had fled from justice.
Now, therefore, to the end that said Mark Kisor may be arrested and brought to trial for the said offense, I do hereby issue this my Proclamation, offering a Reward of Two Hundred Dollars, for the apprehension and delivery of the said Mark Kisor, to the Sheriff of Cabarrus: And I do, moreover, hereby enjoin and require all Officers of this State, Civil and Military, to use their best exertions to apprehend, and to cause to be apprehended, the said fugitive aforesaid.
