Yard and Gallon Measures.

SEALED PROPOSALS will be received at the Executive Office, until the 10th day of June next, for the construction of a STANDARD YARD MEASURE for each County in the State. The Measure to be of Box, or other hard wood, to be approved by the Executive—to be well-lined and stamped, and similar to the standard now in the Executive Office, without the Matrix—the Measure to be well-fitted in a good box of Mahogany, Cherry, Walnut, or other wood to be approved, with appropriate facilities and implements for taking copies from the same.

Similar Proposals will be received also, until the same time, for making one set of STANDARD LIQUID MEASURES for each County in the State, consisting of One Gallon, Half Gallon, Fourth of a Gallon, One Eighth of a Gallon, and One-sixteenth of a Gallon similar to the set now in the Executive Office. Bids will be received to make them of Copper or Brass of sufficient thickness, not after the construction of those in the Office, but of precisely the same capacity—each set to be contained in a good box, securely packed, and ready for delivery.

The Contractor will be required to give bond and good security for the due execution of the work and will have permission to use the Standard in the Executive Office to construct the others by, which can be seen at any time upon application.

The bidders will cause the place of delivery, and the Executive will retain the privilege of declining the bids if he do not approve them.

Each Measure must be thoroughly tested in the presence of the Agent appointed by the Executive for the purpose, and any expense attendant thereon, will be paid by the Contractor.
