New England. It has, perhaps, more than its share
of marvellous anecdotes, in which the celebrated Gen.
M.—a Yankee Farmer, is a celebrated character. The
legend, recited below, was related to me when a child,
by a venerable family visitor.)

Hampton's woods are still, to-night,
As yon spire which breaks the light
Of the half-faded moon. No breeze
Bears the murmur of the seas
From the long white beach, or waves
Elm leaves o'er the village grass.

From the brief dream of a bride,
She hath awakened at his side,
With half-uttered shriek and start—
Feels she not his beating heart?
And the pressure of his arm,
And his breathing near and warm?

Lightly from the bridal bed
Springs that fair dishevelled head;
And, a feeling new, intense,
Half of shame, half innocence,
Maiden fear and wonder, speaks
Through her parted lips and cheeks.

From the oaken mantel glowing
Faintest light the lamp is throwing,
On the mirror's antique mould,
High-backed chair and wainscot old,
And through faded curtains stealing,
His dark sleeping face revealing.

Listless lies the strong man there,
Silver-streaked his careless hair;
