**HARRY OF THE WEST.**  
This being the favorite designation of the great leader of the Whig host, says the Nashville *Banner*, especially on the Atlantic side of the Alleghany, our friends may like to know how it originated. The *Banner* proceeds in the following narrative:

In 1837, some fifty good Whigs and true, went as a delegation from Baltimore to congratulate the New Yorkers in their great victory of November. They had a grand dinner at Nibley's, where the company comprised several thousands. If we mistake not, all reference in toasts or speeches, to the Whig candidates for President was forbidden on that occasion, from an idea that it might excite useless partisanship at the festive board. After dinner, whilst the toasts were going round, and each state was called on for something, the well known Philip Hone, one of the Vice Presidents, made an extra call upon a distinguished member of the Baltimore Delegation, the Hon. John P. Kennedy, author of "Horse-shoe Robinson,"—making a happy allusion to that work, and bringing him very conspicuously before the company. This was out of order, as it was not in the programme. But being called on, Mr. Kennedy took advantage of the trespass and made another. He accordingly wound up a speech of felicitation on the great victory, somewhat after this fashion:

"In the gratulation of this triumph, as well as in the stir and tumult of the contest, we have names to be remembered, which, indeed our country can never forget—I will pledge one that lives fresh in the heart of every Whig;—a name to rally upon when Freedom requires a Champion; to boast of when we are asked for a Patriot; to love when our affections would seek a generous warm hearted Friend;—a name which has a spell in it to gather millions, when free hearts and strong hands are to be summoned in defense of our country's honor; I give you HARRY OF THE WEST."
