North Carolina Election ! The returns which we publish to day, leave h t the shadow of a doubt on our minds, that the State has gone for CLAY and FRELINGHUY. SEN, by an increased majority over the Governor's vote in August. It will be seen by comparing the two votes, that the Whige have gained considerably on Granger's majority of 3,153. The Loco Pocos may gain a little, in New Hanover, Duplin, Sampson, Warren, Person, Caswell, Onslow, Currituck, Lincoln, Rockingham, and Stokes, but then they are done; while we shall increase our vote tremendously in the Mountain District, and considerably in soveral of the Counties of BARRINGER'S District, in Davidson and Randolph, in the whole of RAYNER's District, in Craven, Beaufort, &c. We would be justified in shouting victory now, in the loudest sort of tones, but we prefer to wait for the academicke from the glorious Western Reserve. H CLINGHAN's District alone does not increase our vote 1000, then we shall be greatly disappointed. Saturday morning's mail, will, however, bring full returns.
