

North Carolina Legislature

Wednesday, Nov. 28.

SENATE.

A message was received from the House of Commons stating that they would oppose their proposition to print a paper for each member of the Legislature of the Message of His Excellency, the Governor, and agreed to the proposition to print five.

Mr. Worth presented a petition from Francis J. King praying the Legislature to direct how to ascertain the boundary line of land in the counties of Montgomery and Stokes which was referred to the Committee on Proprietary and Grievances.

Mr. Hildreth presented a resolution to issue a writ of election to the Sheriff of Pitt county commanding him to make election on the 11th December to elect a Senator to supply the vacancy occasioned by the death of John B. Foreman Read and adopted.

Mr. Boyd presented the resignation of James Settle, a Justice of the Peace for the county of Rockingham.

Mr. Joyner presented the following Resolution, which was read and adopted:

Resolved, That so much of the Governor's Message as relates to Rail Roads and Internal Improvements, be referred to the Committee on Internal Improvements.

So much as relates to Common Schools, be referred to the Committee on Education and the Literary Fund.

So much as relates to Agriculture and a Geological, Mineralogical and Agricultural Survey of the State, be referred to a Select Committee.

So much as relates to Asylums be referred to a Select Committee.

And so much as relates to a Penitentiary, to a Select Committee.

Mr. Bogie presented a Bill to lay off and establish a county by the name of Gaston, which passed its first reading.

Mr. Jefferson presented a Bill to lay off and establish a county to be called Morehead, which was referred to the Committee on Proprietary and Grievances.

A message was received from the House, agreeing to the proposition to vote at 12 o'clock for Solicitor of the Sixth Judicial Circuit. The following gentlemen were then put in nomination, v. z.: Haywood W. Guion, Hamilton C. Jones, James Osborne, James R. Dodge.

The Senate then voted as follows:

For James Osborne—Messrs. Speaker, Elliott, Jefferson, and McMillan—5.

For H. W. Guion—Messrs. Cameron, Pastore, and Woodfin—3.

Mr. Elliott presented a Bill to incorporate the Franklinville Guards in the county of Randolph.

Mr. Biddle presented a Bill more effectually to suppress the offence of trading with slaves, which was referred to the Judiciary Committee.

Mr. Jefferson presented a Bill to prohibit the levying of executions upon growing crops, until crops are matured, which was referred to the Committee of the Judiciary.

The Senate agreed to print the report of the Treasury.

Mr. Hildreth presented a Bill to protect the Public Bridges in Tyrrell and Washington counties.

Mr. Boyden presented a Bill to alter the division line between the counties of Lincoln and Catawba.

On motion of Mr. Boyden, a message was sent to the House, proposing to give it an election of Judge of the Superior Court of Law and Equity, to supply the vacancy occasioned by the resignation of the Hon. Frederick Nash, on Monday next at 1 o'clock.

The Senate took a recess until 3 o'clock.

At 3 o'clock.

The following Resolution offered by Mr. Biggs, was read and adopted:

Resolved, That the Committee on the Judiciary inquire into the expediency of giving to the Courts of Law jurisdiction of equitable claims and demands not exceeding the sum of \$50.

Mr. Taylor presented a Bill to cede to the United States, a certain tract of land lying on the Island of Roanoke, Carteret county, for the purpose of erecting a Marine Hospital, which was, on motion of Mr. Hollen, referred to the Committee on the Judiciary.

The hour agreed on by the two Houses to vote for Secretary of State, having arrived, the Hon. Win. M. Hill, the present incumbent, received the unanimous vote of the Senate.

HOUSE OF COMMONS.

Mr. Adams offered a resolution proposing to send a message to the Senate to raise a Joint Select Committee of three, to compare the votes cast in August last for Governor of this State, which was agreed to.

Mr. Poincier offered a resolution in favor of Leonard Zeller, Sheriff of Stokes County, which was referred to the Committee on Clerks.

The Speaker laid before the House a communication from the Treasurer, the reading of which, on motion of Mr. Guion, was dispensed with, and a proposition sent to the Senate to print said Report.

A resolution was offered by Mr. Seales, authorizing the Clerk to furnish each member with a copy of "Indexes to Colonial Documents." He said—My object, Mr. Speaker, in offering this Resolution, is to carry out the intention of the last Legislature, that each member of the present Session should have a copy of these "Indexes," thereby enabling them to act more understandingly upon the recommendations, to which these relate, of His Excellency, the Governor.

Mr. Shepard, in supporting the resolution, entered into the history of these papers, and referred to some interesting incidents connected with the Revolutionary history of North Carolina.

Mr. Gravell of Caswell, made some remarks, indistinct to us. Mr. Moore, of Halifax also inquired, whether it required the co-operation of the Senate, whilst at the suggestion of the Speaker, Mr. Seales moved that his resolution be on the table until the elections for Solicitors should be decided.

On motion of Mr. Pindexter, leave of absence was granted until Monday next, to C. L. Pindexter.

A Resolution offered by Mr. Thomas Wilson, was rejected, proposing to send a message to the Senate, to raise a joint select Committee of four, to whom shall be referred so much of the Governor's Message as relates to Common Schools. The House, objecting on the ground of there being a Committee on Education, and should therefore appropriately be referred to it.

Mr. Saunders offered a Resolution, to refer so much of the Governor's Message as relates to a Penitentiary, to a joint select Committee of five.

Withdrawn, to allow Mr. Moore to offer a series of Resolutions that refer parts of the Message to appropriate Committees.

Mr. Hayes offered a resolution to refer so much of the Message as relates to Cherokee Bonds, to a Joint Select Committee.

Mr. Moore, addressing the Chair, said—I had considerable difficulty in suggesting an appropriate Committee for this part of the Governor's Message, and as he had no disposition to thwart the wishes of any gentleman concerned in these bonds, especially one so deeply interested as is the gentleman from Cherokee, he withdrew his Resolution. Whereupon, Mr. Hayes' Resolution was then adopted.

Mr. Foy introduced a Resolution, which was read and referred to the Committee on Claims, instructing them to inquire and report what sum

was paid by Messrs. Gash and Nathan, of Henderson county, on account of misfortune in the survey of a Tract of Land purchased by them at the sale of Cherokee lands.

Mr. Hildreth introduced a bill to repeat the Judgment of the County Courts of Yancey county, Read and referred to the Judiciary Committee.

Mr. Wilder presented a memorial from Timothy Haskins of Onslow county, contesting the act of T. W. Summers, Commissioner from the County, which was referred to the committee on Elections.

Mr. Moore offered the following Resolution:

Resolved, That a message be sent to the Senate, proposing to raise a joint select committee of five, on the part of each House, to whom shall be referred so much of the Governor's Message, as relates to the Rail Roads and their financial connection with the State.

Also, to raise a joint select committee of three on the part of each House, to whom shall be referred so much of said Message as relates to an Asylum for the Insane and Deaf and Dumb.

Also, to raise a Committee of three on the part of each House to whom shall be referred so much of said Message as relates to Peccancy.

Mr. Hildreth presented a Bill for the establishment of a Board of Agriculture, which was referred to the Committee on Agriculture.

On motion of Mr. Boyden, a message was sent to the House proposing to vote again forthwith. The House concurring, the Senate proceeded to vote.

Mr. Boyden, on the part of the Committee, reported that neither of the candidates in nomination having received a majority of the votes given here, there was no election.

On motion of Mr. Boyden, a message was sent to the House concurring, the Senate proceeded to vote for Monday next.

SENATE.

Mr. Francis presented the memorial of George Soherin, of the County of Cherokee, praying the Legislature to grant him the privilege of working a Silver Mine in Macon County, upon certain restrictions.

Read and referred to the Committee on Proprietary and Grievances.

The Speaker announced Messrs. Woodfin, Francis, Walker, G. W. Thompson and Holmes, the Senator's Committee on Cherokee Bonds.

Also, Messrs. Jeffreys, Smith and Hostetler, the Committee on the Library. Also Messrs. Francis, Wilson and Hellen, the Committee on the Resolution of the Senator from Onslow.

Mr. Woodfin presented the petition of the Stockholders in the Howard Gap Turnpike Company, praying the Legislature to amend their Charter, so as to give them the privilege of working a road through the mountains.

Mr. Joyner presented the following Resolution, which was read and rejected.

Resolved, That the Committee on Internal Improvements, be discharged from the consideration of the Governor's Message as relates to Rail Roads by the State.

Mr. Moore, on the part of the Senate, concurred in the expediency of erecting an Eighth Judicial Circuit for this State, by a Resolution, offered by Mr. Woodfin.

Mr. Joyner presented the following Resolution, which was read and rejected.

Mr. Woodfin presented a Bill to prevent frauds in laying Executions issued by a single Magistrate upon an individual, and to encourage and facilitate the practice of taking security for the forthcoming of property seized under Executions.

Mr. Joyner presented the following Resolution, which was read and rejected.

Mr. Woodfin presented the petition of the Stockholders in the Howard Gap Turnpike Company, proposing to raise a joint select Committee, to inquire into the expediency of erecting before Congress a Bill to establish the Branch Mint at Charlotte in this State.

On motion of Mr. Biggs, the Senate adjourned until tomorrow ten o'clock.

HOUSE OF COMMONS.

Mr. T. R. Caldwell presented two petitions from sundry citizens of McDowell County, which were referred to the Committee on Proprietary and Grievances; one to incorporate the Town of Mayesville, and the other praying an alteration of the dividing line between the Counties of Rutherford and McDowell.

Mr. Moore, from the Judiciary Committee, made a report favorable to a Bill to abolish the Writ of Execution, commonly called an *etatis*. Said Bill was explained by Messrs. Moore and Cherry; it was read and rejected.

Mr. Moore, from the same Committee, reported unfavorably on the Bill concerning Executions.

Provides that the property levied on under Execution shall be appraised, and if it do not bring two thirds of its appraised value, there shall be no sale, but a stay of Execution for twelve months, &c.

Said Bill was put upon its second reading, and on motion of Mr. Currie, indefinitely postponed—yeas 77, nays 22.

Mr. R. P. Williamson presented a memorial from the Officers of the 85th Regiment of Militia, and referred to the Committee on Proprietary and Grievances.

Mr. Waddill, in order to make a compromise with the two gentlemen, said—I propose to amend the amendment by inserting four, which was agreed to.

Also, a joint select Committee of five, was appointed to inquire into the expediency of erecting before Congress a Bill to establish the Branch Mint at Charlotte in this State.

On motion of Mr. Biggs, the Senate adjourned until Monday morning 10 o'clock.

HOUSE OF COMMONS.

The Journal of yesterday being read, the Clerk announced, Messrs. Hayes, Keener, Fleming, Mills and Gamblin, the Committee on the part of this House, on Cherokee Bonds.

Mr. Davis presented a Bill to extend the time for registering Grants, Deeds of Mease, Conveyances, Bills of Sale and Deeds of Gift.

Mr. Graves, from the Committee on Proprietary and Grievances reported unfavorably on the Bill to establish a County to be called Morehead, recommending its rejection.

Mr. Moore asked a division of the question.

The Speaker announced that the question would first be on striking out.

He then stated the question, and said as usual, "Is the House ready for the question?" Gentlemen, as many as are of the opinion that these roads were to be struck out, said "Aye."

A question of order was raised by Mr. Shepard calling for the Ayes and Nays.

The Speaker said the 32nd rule required that when the Yeas and Nays are called for, on any question, it shall be on motion before the question is put.

Mr. Shepard asked to be heard on that matter.

The Speaker replying, he would hear the gentleman with pleasure, though he had no doubt on the point.

"Mr. Moore was not made by the Speaker to a joint Select Committee, but as the Senate differs in this view, he thought the next best reference to be, to the Resolution proposed, to a Select Committee of this House.

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
