\$200 REWARD.
A PROCLAMATION,
By His Excellency the Governor of North Carolina.
WHEREAS, one Hulan Sisk, late of the County
of Stokes, stands charged on affidavit made
before Matthew R. Moore, a Justice of the Peace for
said County, with having, on the 20th day of June
last, in said County of Stokes, feloniously killed and
murdered one Jesse A. Terrell.

And whereas, it is further shown to me, by the
return of an officer of said County, to whom was dis-
patched a State's Warrant commanding the apprehen-
sion of the said Hulan Sisk for the Murder aforesaid,
that he, the said Hulan Sisk, has fled from justice,
and has probably escaped beyond the limits of this
State.

Now to the end that the said Hulan Sisk may be
apprehended and brought to justice, I do hereby
issue this Proclamation, offering a reward of Two
Hundred Dollars for his apprehension and delivery
to the Sheriff of Stokes County, or for his commit-
ment to any Jail in the United States, provided the
same be more than two hundred miles distant from
Germany, the Court House of the County aforesaid,
and I do moreover enjoin and require all offi-
