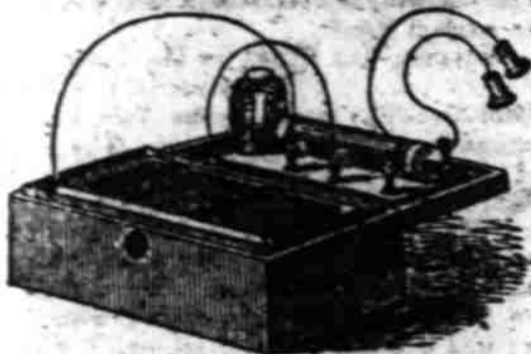

Richmond Law School.

THE term of this Institution commences on the 15th of October, and terminates on the 15th of March, following.
There are two Courses of Law in the School: the General or Elementary Course, embracing outlines of the Law of Nature and Nations, Civil Policy, with particular views of the Constitution of Virginia, and of the United States, and the principles of the Municipal Law of Virginia with the subjects of Pleading and Evidence;—and the Practical or Professional Course—embracing the Principles of the Municipal Law of Virginia, in connection with the various forms of action in use, together with the points of Pleading and Evidence, applicable to them respectively, and other matters, at some length.
And there is also a Course of Rhetoric, embracing the principles of the Art, more particularly as applicable to argument at the Bar.
There are Lectures, Readings, Recitations, Examinations and Exercises of different kinds for the students, in all the Courses.
The fee for instruction is \$60 for the term, for either of the Courses of Law, or \$80 for both of them (or parts of them) together; and \$20 for the Course of Rhetoric—payable in advance.
The instruction of the School will be modified to accommodate Students from other States.
