ON Monday, the 29th day of December next, by virtue of a Decree of the Court of Equity for Wake County, at its Autumn Session, 1845, in a suit of the Governor, for use of the State of North Carolina, to foreclose a Mortgage, therefore executed by the Raleigh and Gaston Rail Road Company, to indemnify the State against certain liabilities for said Company, I will sell at Public Auction, at the Court House door in the City of Raleigh, to the highest bidder, the whole property of the Raleigh and Gaston Rail Road Company aforesaid, (so far as the same is known to me,) consisting of 87 miles of Rail Road, reaching from the City of Raleigh to Gaston, on the North side of the Roanoke River, in the direct line of public conveyance to Petersburg, City Point, Richmond, Washington City, Baltimore, &c. &c. together with all Bridges, Depots, Workshops and Tools, Warehouses, Water Stations, Engines, Cars, &c. &c. Also, the stock of Iron, Lumber, and Fire Wood, which may then be on hand, and other articles, owned and used by said Company for keeping up said Rail Road, and transportation on the same. From the nature of the property, it will be sold en masse.  
The purchaser, by the terms of the Decree, and the Act of the Legislature in relation to it, will become, ipso facto, a body corporate, by the name and style of the present Company, and will acquire all the franchises, privileges, rights and immunities now possessed by it, for the term of 80 years, which its Charter has yet to run. These franchises and privileges are of the most advantageous kind to the Company, and may be found at large in their Charter, contained in the 2d Volume of the Revised Statutes of North Carolina, page 299, which is to be seen at the State of Government, and in most of the Public Libraries of the States of the Union.

1st, 29th June, 1846, \$25,000.

4th, the 29th of December, 1848, one fourth of do.  
5th, the 29th of October, 1849, one fourth of do.  
The cost of this Rail Road and its appurtenances, completed only five years since, was \$1,500,000—one half of which was borrowed; creating a debt bearing interest, on failure to pay which, a sale has become necessary. The grading, Bridges, Depots, &c. are executed in an excellent style of workmanship. Cars run daily over it, carrying the Mail of the United States, (it being a part of the Southern Metropolitan route,) at a compensation of \$100 per mile, or \$9,700 per annum, through nearly its whole length, its freight for the transportation of Produce and Merchandise, independently of the receipts from Passengers, afford a considerable addition to the ordinary sources of profits on Rail Roads. Though not now yielding a profit on the large sum expended in its construction, its income has been increasing for some time past, and it is confidently believed that it would produce a reasonable return upon a more moderate amount of capital invested in its purchase.
