

They may continue in the School, as long, as by their good conduct, they entitle themselves to its privileges The use of Tobacco, in any form, by the boys, will not be allowed. A style of dress, simple and uniform, will be prescribed. And above all, and this is the great object of the School, a constant endeavor will be made so to imbue the minds of the children with moral and religious knowledge, principles, and affections, that when they really get to be men, they may be fitted to discharge the high functions of an American citizen, with an eye steadily directed towards their citizenship in that "better country, which is cternal in the heavens." To this end, the Head of the School will be a Clergeman, who will be the spiritual father of the boys; and a chapel will be erected-the daily services of which, it is earnestly hoped, will mate-

rially contribute towards " bringing many sons unto g'ory." Due notice will be given of the time when the School will be opened, which, probably, will not be later than the 1st July. After the opening of the School, its Sessions will correspond with those of 1 of 5,000 | St Mary's, for the convenience of parents and guar-1 of 2,000 dians, who may desire to send children to both

Schools. The expense for board, washing, &c. with tuition in the Ancient Languages, English and French, will not exceed \$175 per annum. The advantages of every kind afforded to the boys, will be at least equal to those furnished by the best Northern Schools.
