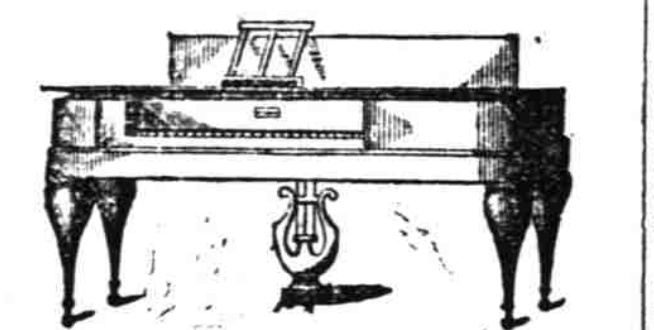

### Trinity School.

IT is designed by the Bishop of the Diocese, to open a School for Boys in the neighborhood of Raleigh. For this purpose, an estate has been purchased about 8 miles from the City, which, in respect to retirement, healthfulness, and pleasantness of situation, is what can be desired for such an institution. The buildings will accommodate, comfortably, thirty boys, which, for the present, must be the limit of the School. It is designed, in this School, to revive a class, which, unfortunately, has become almost extinct in our community, namely, the class of boys. With this view, pupils will be admitted at any period of childhood, however early, but not after they are 14 years of age. They may continue in the School, as long, as by their good conduct, they entitle themselves to its privileges. The use of Tobacco, in any form, by the boys, will not be allowed. A style of dress, simple and uniform, will be prescribed. And above all, and this is the great object of the School, a constant endeavor will be made to imbue the minds of the children with moral and religious knowledge, principles, and affections, that when they really get to be men, they may be fitted to discharge the high functions of an American citizen, with an eye steadily directed towards their citizenship in that "better country, which is eternal in the heavens." To this end, the Head of the School will be a Clergyman, who will be the spiritual father of the boys; and a chapel will be erected—the daily services of which, it is earnestly hoped, will materially contribute towards "bringing many sons unto glory."

Due notice will be given of the time when the School will be opened, which, probably, will not be later than the 1st July. After the opening of the School, its Sessions will correspond with those of St. Mary's, for the convenience of parents and guardians, who may desire to send children to both Schools.  
The expense for board, washing, &c. with tuition in the Ancient Languages, English and French, will not exceed \$175 per annum. The advantages of every kind afforded to the boys, will be at least equal to those furnished by the best Northern Schools.  
Till the appointment of a Rector, application for the admission of pupils, or for information, may be made to the Bishop of the Diocese, or to the Subscriber, in Raleigh.

The design of the Military Department being to fit the Pupils to act, in case of emergency, as Officers, the West Point system of instruction will be carefully pursued, nor will the Army Tactics be departed from, in order to exhibit the boys for the benefit of the Institution, or for any other purposes.  
By an Act of the last Legislature, the necessary arms and equipments will be furnished by the State, but Parents who wish their children instructed in the Military Department, will be required to provide them with the prescribed Uniform.  
Parents and Guardians, are requested not to allow their Children or Wards to have accounts in the City, but to deposit the money, for the purchase of necessaries, in the hands of the Principal.  
N. B. A few Pupils will be taken as Boarders, by the Principal of the Academy.
