NORTH CAROLINA ELECTION.

The returns, received since our last confirm our statement of the general result, viz: SIX Whigs to THREE Loco Foco Congressmen; but we are enabled to add some further details.

In the Salisbury District, Mr. BOYDEN is elected by a large majority. Mr. B. is a man of powerful intellect, and ought to be made Chairman of some Committee, appointed to investigate abuses of corruption, and we hope he will be. He can neither be influenced by fear or favor, and all the storms of Loco Focism will prove impotent either to bend or break his purpose. He is, emphatically, an honest, firm, and independent man, and will make himself known to the country before he has been long in Congress.

In the Mountain District, we presume, from what we hear, that Hon. THOMAS L. CLINGMAN has been elected over his competitor, Gen. BYNUM. We are highly gratified to announce, also, the election of that indefatigable young champion of Whig principles, in the Newbern District, R. S. DONNELLY, Esq. A few days since, it was reported that his success was doubtful, and Loco Focism was in high glee at his anticipated defeat. But "a frost, a killing frost," has nipped all their cherished hopes, and they now most reluctantly acknowledge, that Mr. DONNELLY is elected.

The most astonishing result has taken place in the Edenton District. Two years ago, BIGGS was elected by 146 majority, and, now, he has been beaten, by his same competitor, some six or seven hundred votes. We care not for the causes that have produced this result—the result, itself, is glory enough for one campaign.
