

ADJUTANT GENERAL'S OFFICE. )

Raleigh, Sept. 8th, 1847. The President of the United States having authorized the acceptance of a Volunteer Company of Infantry to be raised in North Carolina, under the command of Capt. JOHN CAMERON, to serve during the War with Mexico, and requested the co operation of the Governor in organizing the same : It is therefore enjoined on all Military Officers of the State, to lend their aid in furtherance of this object, in such mode as they may severally deem most conducive to

the speedy completion of this Corps. The organization of the Company will be similar to that of those already in service from this State. A place of rendezvous will be designated as soon as it is ascertained what point will be most convenient for those who may volunteer. By order of His Excellency, WILL. A. GRAHAM.
