Besides the monthly pay, above stated, one ration per day is allowed every soldier, which is amply suf- | 1 of ficient for his subsistence-also, a large supply of 1 of comfortable and genteel clothing. Good quarters 1 of and fuel are at all times furnished ; and every attent on will be paid to making those men who may enhat, and are determined to serve their country in good faith, comfortable and c ntented with their situation. The best medical attendance is always provided for the sick soldier; and no deduction of pay is made during the period he is unable to peform his duty. Should the soldier be disabled in the line of his duty, the laws provide a pension for him.

By the above it is seen that the pay and allowances are respectable, and that, with prolence and ecinomy, the monthly pay of the soldier may be laid up-as everything requisite for his comfort and con-venience is furnished by the Government, including his sugar and coffee. 
