PREAMBLE AND RESOLUTIONS :

Whereas, it is the right and duty of the People to assemble in their primary meetings, freely to discuss Delegates to represent the Whigs of Franklin in their public affairs, and to express their sentiments the State Convention. upon all matters affecting their rights as citizens;
