The plans and proposals will be received by the Commissioners at Goldsborough, on Monday the 13th day of November next, when they will make a selection of such plans as they may deem best, and at which time and place, all persons desirous of contracting, are requested to attend in person, and hand in their plans and proposals for building. Sufficient time will be given them for making estimates, on the plans which may be selected, so that the contracts can be closed during the week.

If the plan or plans selected, should be those of any person or persons, who should not get the contract for building, a liberal compensation will be paid for such plan or plans.
