IN A SERIES OF SERMONS, BY Timothy Dwight, D. D. LL. D. LATE PRESIDENT OF YALE COLLEGE.

It is well known, that Dr. DWIGHT, in connection with the office of of President, held that of Professor of Divinity; and was the stated Preacher in the College Chapel. It is the duty of the Professor of Divinity to preach to the Students a regular course of Systematic Theology once in four years. While Minister of Greenfield, Dr. DWIGHT had devoted his attention, in a degree not then usual, to the study of Systematic Theology. At that time he formed the great outline of the work, now offered to the public; and, during his residence there, preached the whole of it, twice, from short notes.—After his election to the Presidency of Yale College he materially enlarged and altered it; and occasionally, added new sermons.—During the first eight years, he preached from his manuscripts written in short hand. In 1804 the Corporation empowered him to employ an amanuensis. He then began, by the help of such an assistant, to write out his Sermons at full length; and, in the course of that and the three following years, he completed the work. After its completion, he preached it twice; and had made some progress in a third course when he was removed by death. When fully written out, he submitted it to the critical examination of several of the most judicious and sensible Divines whom our country could boast. It need not be added, that he readily availed himself of the remarks of these gentlemen; nor, that, in every subsequent revision, each sermon underwent his careful examination.

It will be seen, from this statement of Facts, that Dr. DWIGHT possessed advantages for completing a work of this kind, which will rarely be enjoyed by any man. To the Alumni of Yale College, who have heard the whole system of Sermons delivered in the College Chapel; to the gentlemen, who, occasionally, heard parts of preached; to those, who were personally acquainted with the A-

uthor, and understood the character of his mind; and, to those, to know his high reputation as a preacher; it is not necessary to mention the improvement which made of these advantages.—Others in our country, it may be proper to suggest, that, for sound common sense, for force of intellect, for originality of thought, for clearness of method, for vigour and brilliancy of imagination, for correctness of taste, for a happy style and classical language, and for impassioned eloquence, for candour and catholicism, for single eye to the Truth, for fervant piety and zeal for God, for the love of the souls of men, for tenderness of feeling and of manner, for a clear and natural explanation of the more difficult doctrines of the Bible, and for noble and exalted views of GOD, of his attributes, of his Providence, of his works, especially his great work, the work of Redemption, of JESUS CHRIST as God-man, and of the Glorious System of Truths unfolded in the Scriptures; DR. DWIGHT was surpassed by few of his contemporaries. Such, only, will need to be informed; that his tenants harmonized with the Westminster Confession and Catechism; that throughout the whole twenty-one years, he made VINCENT'S EXPLANATION OF THE SHORTER CATECHISM his constant Text Book, in his Theological Lectures to the Senior Class; and that his System of doctrine is built "on the foundation of the Prophets, and Apostles, JESUS CHRIST himself being the chief corner stone."

New South Wales.

Dreadful Massacre.—A vessel named the Brothers, brings an account of the massacre of several of her's and the Trial's crew, by the new Zealanders at Frial Harbour, at the estimate distance of 450 miles S. E. of the Missionary Station at the Bay of Islands, being between the river Thames and Mercury Bay.—The Trial sailed from Sidney on the 23d of May, for the Marquesas, intending to call at New Zealand, and there join the Brothers, which had a few days previously taken her departure for that place, chiefly for the purpose of collecting flax.—They remained a month at the Bay of Islands, and from thence adopted a south easterly course, trading with the natives as they went along Making a short stay at a harbor which did not appear to have been before frequented by any Europeans, they named it Frial Harbor, and received very friendly treatment, with a promise of having a quantity of flax provided against the return of the vessels. They went towards Cook's Straits, and after running down a considerable extent of coast returned to Frial Harbor, which proved a scene of carnage. The natives appeared no less friendly than before, but not having procured the flax according to their promise, Mr. Howell and Mr. Burnett prepared for quitting the place. They designed sailing thence on Monday 21st of August, but were attacked on the noon of the preceding day, and the decks of both vessels taken possession of by an immense number of the natives.

Mr. Howell's account of the transaction states that at half past 12 A. M. he observed a number of canoes alongside both vessels, but that from the friendly terms he was on with the chiefs and the natives, he had no suspicion of any design against the vessels, both which were provided with boarding nets, through the interstices of which they bartered their commodities with the islanders. The Trial's crew were down at dinner; Mr. Howell was on the quarter deck, folding a mat with a friendly chief; the latter, on some signal supposed to have been given by the former, sprung upon Mr. Howell with his club, and struck him on the back of the head; he reeled, half stunned; a second blow was aimed at him, which he avoided by rushing forward and precipitating himself down the fore-castle hatchway.—The assailants now crowded upon the upper deck, of which they had obtained complete possession, while several who had intruded themselves between decks were opposed by the people and killed. Those above tried to ship the main hatch, in order to shut the crew below, but to prevent this, two men were stationed, at the hatch way, who kept them off with their muskets. Their numbers increased and a rush was momentarily expected. A constant fire was kept up from below, and
