State of N. Carolina Jones County.

A/ HEREAS complaint upon oath hath this day been made to us, two of the Justices of the Peace of the said county, by Edward S. Jones of the Said county, that a certain Negro Slave belonging to him, named LUKE hath absented himself from his said master's service, and is lurking about in the county, committing acts of felony and other misdeeds: These are therefore in the name of the state, to com mand the said slave forthwith to surrender himself and return home to his said master; and we do hereby also require the Sheriff of the said county of Jones, to make diligent search and pursuit after the said slave, and him having found, to apprehend and secure so that he may be conveyed to his said master, or otherwise discharged as the law directs; and the said She iff is hereby authorised and empowered, to raise and take with him such power of his coun ty as he shall think at for apprehending the said slave. And we do hereby by virtue of the act of Assembly in such case provided, intimate and declare, that if the said slave, named Luke, doth not our ender himself and return home immediately after the publication of these presents, that any person may kill and destroy the saip slave, by such means as he of they or impeachment of any crime of offence for so doing, and withour incurring any penalty and forfeiture thereby.

To any Person who shall or may apprehend the aforesaid Negro Slave Luke and deliver him to my or confine him, so that I get him alive shall receive a Reward of Twenty Dollars, or if his head be delivered, Forty Dollars Reward will be paid by me, as I consider the above fellow Luke, to be legally Outlawed.
