Jones County.

WHEREAS complaint upon oath hath this day been made to us, two of the Justices of the Peace of the said county, by Edward S. Jones of the said county, that a certain Negro Slave belonging to him, named LUKE, hath absented himself from his said master's service, and is lurking about in the county, committing acts of felony and other misdeeds: These are therefore in the name of the state, to command the said slave forthwith to surrender himself and return home to his said master; and we do hereby also require the Sheriff of the said county of Jones, to make diligent search and pursuit after the said slave, and him having found, to apprehend and secure so that he may be conveyed to his said master, or otherwise discharged as the law directs; and the said Sheriff is hereby authorized and empowered, to raise and take with him such power of his county as he shall think fit for apprehending the said slave. And we do hereby by virtue of the act of Assembly in such case provided, intimate and declare, that if the said slave, named Luke, doth not surrender himself and return home immediately after the publication of these presents, that any person may kill and destroy the said slave, by such means as he or they may think fit, without accusation or impeachment of any crime or offence for so doing, and without incurring any penalty and forfeiture thereby.

Given under our hands and seals, the 6th day of April, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and seventeen.

FOREIGN NEWS.

New York, April 4.

Latest from London.

The brig Wrangler, that arrived last evening from Havre-de-Grace touched at the Isle of Wight where she procured London Papers to the 7th February. We were not so fortunate as to obtain the loan of them, but understand they do not contain any news of moment. Parliament had met and proceeded to business. After the Prince Regent had delivered his speech and was returning to Carlton House, his carriage was attacked by the mob, pelted with stones and the windows broken.

By the arrival of the ship Sachem, from Port-au-Prince, we learn, that the privateer Cioro, Ford, formerly the Ant, of Baltimore, had been seized, together with her three prizes, by Petion, and it was expected they would all be condemned. A large amount of specie was found on board the privateer, and taken possession of by the government.

The privateer, True-blooded Yankee, Jewett, had sent into Port-au-Prince, the schooner Mary, of New-York, owned by a Mr. Strong, on board. Captain Jewett had relinquished his claim to the Mary, but the government had seized and taken possession of her.

A large privateer schooner commanded by Champlin, had touched in at Port-au-Prince for

supplies where she remained 4 days. The government were about to seize the schr, when captain Champlin ordered his men to quarters, and threatened to sink the first vessel, great or small, that attempted to come alongside with an officer from the government.

LONDON, Jan. 31.

A proclamation has been published, offering 1000l. reward for the apprehension of the person or persons guilty of the late treasonable attempt on the life of the Prince Regent.

Wednesday evening a Proclamation was issued, appointing the thirteenth of Feb. next, instead of the third, and until the 27th day of Feb. as the period of time for receiving the Old and issuing the New Silver Coinage.—Each Banker upon giving a written bond undertaking to return the same value in old silver of the realm, received on Thursday of the Bank of England on issue of the new coin to the amount of 1200l.

Markets—We mentioned last week that government had in contemplation to impose a duty of 20s. per load on Timber from British America, the measure is not yet decided upon, and the only information we have to give upon this very important subject is, that Government have assured the Committee of Canada Merchants and Ship Owners, that nothing will finally be decided upon without their being previously made fully acquainted with every particular.

Corn—The supplies of every description of grain, both of English and Foreign, were most extensive yesterday; a great proportion, however, was reported to be late for the samples to be brought to market yesterday it was supposed that the imports would chiefly consist of new corn, which will greatly add to the difficulty existing of effecting sales of middling and ordinary Grain, the picked samples of English Wheat, and good old Foreign at market, met a moderate demand at 2s. advance; ordinary and even middling new Wheat, were almost unsaleable at any price; there is no proportion in the rates of Wheat fine old may be quoted 6l 10s. & the ordinary new 56s to 65s. there is, however, evidently in the country a plentiful supply, consisting of middling and ordinary descriptions of Wheat. The best samples of Barley was 6s middling qualities 8s. to 10s. lower; the stained dry parcels may be stated a decline of 2s. the fine Oats supported the late currency, but the market is perfectly glutted with ordinary new, for which scarcely any offers are made.—Old beans are 2s lower, the sound new realized an advance of 3s.

A Dutch Mail arrived this morning.

BRUSSELS, Jan. 27.

A great many vessels laden with corn, for the Russian and Prussian troops, have arrived at Ghent, and more expected.

January 29.

The prices of corn are fallen in several markets in Flanders, at Antwerp, Louvain, and Brussels. A further decline is expected to day. In the French ports too, more corn begins to arrive; several vessels laden with corn have arrived lately at Havre.

(Message from the Prince Regent)

Lord Sidmouth presented a Message to the House from the Prince Regent.

The Message was read by the Lord Chancellor, and was as follows:

“His Royal Highness the Prince Regent, acting in the name and on the behalf of his Majesty has thought proper to order to be laid before the House of Lords, papers containing an account of certain meetings and combinations held in different parts of the country, tending to the disturbance of the public tranquility, the alienation of the affections of the people
