THE TWIN SISTERS.

The following communication was promised to our readers some weeks since; but its author was anxious for another opportunity of verifying the impressions he had formed by personal inspection. The following is furnished as the fruit of his recent researches. We must confess that his description is very singular and surprising—if true, it would add new force to the remark of HAMLET, that there "are more things in heaven and earth, than are dreamed of in our philosophy."—But, however, strange it may appear, we have no doubt it presents a perfect transcript of the author's impressions. He is well known, a citizen of this place, whose veracity has never been impeached.

To the Editor of the Enquirer.

SIR

During my excursion in the country last week, I was induced to visit the two remarkable young twin ladies, to whom is attributed the remarkable faculty of knowing each other's thoughts, of whom some notice was taken last winter in some of the newspapers printed in this state. Having been in the habit of visiting occasionally for several years past, the neighborhood where they live and having repeatedly heard from such good authority as left no doubt on my mind that they did possess the remarkable faculty of knowing each other's thoughts and feelings when separate from each other, I feel warranted, having seen them myself, to exhibit the evidence of this faculty; and having tried the thing to the entire satisfaction of my mind, I feel entirely justifiable in giving it as my decided opinion that all that has been attributed to them on this subject is correct. When I was first introduced into their company on this occasion, they showed some aversion to afford me the satisfaction I wished; but at length complied. They accordingly were placed as I wished them—one above stairs and the other in the room where I sat. There could not have been the least chance for any sign to have been given. One would seem to fix her mind on a subject, quite immaterial what, and would communicate in a whisper what she was thinking about, and immediately I would ask the one above stairs what she was thinking about and the answer would be the same. This I think was tried not less than twenty times, without failing in one instance; the word however that was frequently used to convey the idea was not always the same.

After they had gone on for some time in their own way expressing their thoughts on such subjects as would occur to them, without asking them any questions or endeavouring to make them think on such subjects as would be proposed, more fully to satisfy my mind that the subjects which they had been thinking on so precisely alike had not been previously arranged, so to follow each other as for them to understand them,

I, with others of the company in the room, put to them several questions on various subjects, to which answers were given by them as readily and as correctly as had been done on the previous questions; a few of which I will state. While one of the young ladies was sitting opposite a window and seemed to be noticing the appearance of the weather, she was asked what she thought of the weather? Her reply was, she thought it would snow before the next day. The same question was directly put to the other: her reply was, she thought it would snow before the next night. She was then asked if she had any other ideas connected with the one just expressed relative to the state of the weather (at which moment a number of snow birds were to be seen in the yard; her reply was that she thought the snow birds staid much longer this spring than usual. The same question was asked the one above stairs, who expressed the same opinion respecting the snow birds. After some time had elapsed and the conversation turned on other subjects, this young lady, just as in common conversation speaking of a certain gentleman who was a widower, and had, it was said, come in from Kentucky a short time previous to that, for the purpose of getting a wife, this young lady observed with considerable humour, that she was very sorry that he had been disappointed. The one up stairs was asked what she was thinking about. She replied as humorously as the other had done, mentioning the name of the man who had just been alluded to, that she was very sorry that he had been disappointed, and if he would come again he should not go back as he came. There happened at that time to be a gentleman in the room who was a widower, who to satisfy his own curiosity and remove his particular doubts as to what he was witnessing, desired the lady down stairs to have the goodness to think something about him. She fixing her eye on him for a moment, replied, his cravat was not tied on as a widower's should be. He asked the one above stairs, what she was thinking about. She replied, his cravat was not tied with a widower's knot. This appeared quite to satisfy him as to the matter.

In this way they continued for several hours, without, as I have just stated, failing to express in substance the same things whenever they were asked. A few having seen and conversed with these ladies as I have done, and from time to time when I have been in that neighbourhood, conversed with so many different persons of respectability who are well acquainted with these girls, strange and unacceptable it may seem to be! I must be a sceptic not to believe it.—It must be a subject of so much noisiness in that part of the country, is that there are two such persons living there, he however met with some persons who knew them very well, who seemed to doubt the truth of what they have heard of them but in every case that I saw, they were persons who had never seen them try their faculty.

These young ladies are 21 years of age; they are remarkably healthy, well looking girls; I weighed them twice during the day that I was in their company. There was about one pound difference in their weights. Their features, complexions and gestures, are so precisely alike that I could not distinguish one from the other. Their parents informed me, and it is what is generally said of them, that when one is sick, the other is sick; what one dislikes, the other dislikes;

what pleases one, pleases the other; and an injury done to one, is received in the same way by the other; that each of them, if I mistake not the number, has had three teeth extracted for the tooth ache, and all the same teeth; and that they have both now one decayed tooth, and that as the same tooth.

These parents have had six children at three births; five of whom are living; the two alluded to are of the second birth of twins; one of those of the first birth died when young, the other is still living, is about thirty years of age, and he is a perfect dwarf, not weighing more than about 50 lbs. All the rest of these children are remarkably robust and hearty, and rather above the common size. The other two twins are not yet fully grown; but nothing remarkable has been discovered about them. They live about 5 1/2 miles from this place, and in the lower end of the county of Fluvanna near the line of Goochland and Louisa; and should any person feel sufficient curiosity to induce them to visit these remarkable persons, and judge for themselves, directions to the house can easily be obtained.

HOSTILITY OF SPAIN.

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OUR readers will see, by the documents published this evening, which was received by this morning's mail, by the way of Baltimore, and furnished us by the kindness of a friend, that the Spaniards have already struck the blow. The ship Beaver, owned by John Jacob Astor, of this city, and laden with a very valuable cargo, and the brig Canton, of Salem, have been seized at Talcahuana, and their crews thrown into prison, for being engaged in a trade which the mother country had deemed unlawful, but which the patriots in possession had declared free.—For trading with these ports, American vessels are seized and their crews imprisoned, while British vessels are permitted to trade unmolested. Against such an act of hostility, the Gov. of Chili, very spiritedly has, as will be seen, entered his protest, as a breach of the law of nations, in doing violence to a neutral port. The particulars are transmitted to congress, and will probably soon appear in an official form.

Violation of the law of Nations.

By Mr. Francis Reeves, second supercargo of the American ship BEAVER, which sailed from the port of N. Y. destined to the N. West Coast, the island of Japan, and Canton, who took refuge in this place the 15th inst after having escaped with five other individuals from the prison of Talcahuana, where they were confined, we have been informed that having approached this port in search of water, wood and fresh provisions, after a voyage of 106 days the above ship was surprised in the vicinity of the island of Quinquini, by an armed force, who took possession of her, and immediately begun to search and plunder what ever they could lay their hands upon, without sparing the clothes, papers and other necessaries of the officers of that ship; and after having committed the greatest excesses and insulted them in
