They write from Hanover, That the Craue in the 18th of the Treaty of Aix-la-Chappel, (which stipulated the claim of a certain Sum of Money, which his Ma- jesty, as Elector of Hanover, has upon the Crown of Spain, should be forthwith settled in an amicable Manner, by Commisaries appointed for that Purpose on both Sides, or in such other Manner as they might agree upon,) not being yet executed, the Regency of that Electorate lately sent over a Memorial to the King, praying his Majesty to get this Affair terminated; in Consequence of which, Orders have since been sent to the Ambassador to make proper Re- presentations to the Spanish Ministry.

An Exp. ion having been demanded of the Court of Spain, in Regard to the Destination of her Armaments, the Dutch Gazettes tell us, that the Spanish Minister has declared, that Nobly need take any Umbrage at those Ar- maments, as his Court means nothing more thereby than to re-establish her Marine, (which anyone may know to be partly true, without being a Conjuror) and to contribute, in other Respects, to consolidate the Peace; being firmly re- solved to adhere constantly to this Maxim, so long as the other Powers of Europe do not manifest any Dispositions that may put them under a Necessity to deviate therefrom; in which Case his Catholic Majesty would not have Recourse to any other Measures than such as his Honour and Dignity would oblige him to take.

Some private Letters from the South of France intimate, that certain Military Regulations will be quickly published, in order to hinder the Officers in his most Christian Majes- ty's Service from running into any unnecessary Expence, by prohibiting the Use of Gold and Silver Lace, Fringes, Feathers, Sword Knots, &c. the Pope and the Soldier in that Country being incompatible Characters.

Sept. 28. We learn from Petersburg, that Count Ra- zamoufki, the new General of the Cossacks, has ordered very strong Detachments to go in Pursuit of the Heyda- macks, with express Orders to give them no Quarter; and as there are several Bodies of Polish Troops in quest of them likewise, it is believed they hardly will escape.

It is currently reported, that some new Peers will be created in a very little Time, and that as several Affairs of very high Importance will, during the next Sessions, fall under Consideration of Parliament, the Time of their sit- ting may be longer than is generally expected.

We hear that several curious and accurate have been made of the Officers employ'd by certain Boards, with their known Salaries, and computed Perquisites, together with Estimates of the Expence arising from the Pay and Perquisites of those by whom the Business is actually done; from whence a Parallel may be formed between Public and Parish Economy, and some good Hints taken to correct both.

Orders are sent to his Majesty's Yards to keep the Men of War laid up in such Repair, that they may be able to be made ready for the Sea in a short Time.

In the Utrecht Gazette we find the following Paragraph, dated Versailles, September 25.

The Marshal, Minister Plenipotentiary from the King of Prussia, frequents the Court very assiduously, and is treated there with the highest Regard. Nothing can be more gra- cious than the Reception this Minister met with from the King, when he had his first publick Audience. My Lord Marshal is no Stranger in France; he formerly resided a good while in this Kingdom. We have been surprized to see certain idle Reflections concerning him in the Relations of London, of the Gazette of L-- (So they express it, and we cannot make it clear.) They (those idle Reflections) must necessarily fall to the Ground, if one will but con- sider the Quality of the Potentate by whom he is employ'd, and the Character in which he has been sent to this Court. — Now with their Leave, we must observe, that their taking so much Notice of idle Reflections, gives the Publick some Reason to suspect that they may not be altogether groundless
