And the faid Shoriff is hereby impowered to raife and take with him such Power of his County as he shall think fit, for apprehending the faid Slave. And we do hereby, by Virine of an Act of Affem-bly of this Province concerning Servants and Slaves, intimate and declare, if the faid Slave dorn not furrender himself, and return home, immediately after the Publication of these Presents, that then any Person may kill or destroy the said Slave, by fuch Means as he or they may think fit, without Acculation or Impeachment of any Crime or Offence for fo doing, or without incurring any Penalty or Forfeiture thereby.
