Jefus Chrift, that my repentance, however late, however imperfect, may not be in vain.

" The little good that now remains in my power, is to warn others against those temptations by which I have been feduced. I have always finned against conviction ; my principles have never been fhaken ; I have always confidered the Chriftian religion as a revelation from G d, and its divine author as the Saviour of the world ; but the laws of God, though never difowned b me, have often been forgotten. I was led aftray from religious strictness by the delusion of shew, and the delights of voluptuouinels. I never knew nor attended to the calls of frugality, nor needful œconomy of life. Vanity and pleasure, into which I plunged, required expence difproportionate to my income; expence brought dittreis upon me, dittreis, importunate distrefs, urged me to temporary fraud.

" For this fraud I am to die; and I die declaring, in the moit folemn manner, that however I have deviated from my own precepts, I have taught others to the best of my knowledge, and with all fincerity the true way to eternal happinefs, My life for fome few unhappy years past has been dreadfully erroneous, but my ministry has always been fincere. I have confantly beleived, and now I leave the world folemnly avowing my conviction, that there is no other name under Heaven, by which we can be faved, but only the name of the Lord Jefus; and I entreat all who are here to join with me in my laft petition, that for the fake of that Lord Jefus Chrift, my fins may be for jiven, and my foul received into his everlafting kingdom.

JULY 10. The following article of intelligence was received by Thursday's mail, in a letter from Berlin, dated June 28, and its authenticity is vouched :

" A few weeks ago two American gentlemen, faid to be deputies from the Congress, arrived here at the hotel de Corfica. One of them faid to be Dr. Lee from Madrid on his return to France.] They have already bought and contracted for immenfe quantities of linnen and woollen cloth, tents; arms, &c. for the use of the American army. They are visited and invited by the first nobility here, who, as well as other ranks of people, receive them with the greatest courtefy and politenefs. It was univerfally reported, that they have with them an addrefs from the Congress to our King, which they were to have delivered in a public manner. Two or three days ago, whilft they were upon a vifit at a nobleman's feat a few miles from town, their apartments at the hotel were broke open, the locks of all their trunks and coffers forced, and all the papers they contained carried off. It is very fingular that all the cafh and bank notes, drafts upon the most emittent bankers at Paris, Amiterdam and Hamburgh, (to a very confiderable amount). were left entouched; which circumstance leaves not the least doubt but the felony was committed by a flate's burglar. And last night, between II and Iz o'clock, all the papers were found in a bag before the gate of the hotel, except fuch as were of the highest interest and import, which are still milling.

That the thanks of Congress in their own name, and in behalf of the inhabitants of the Thirteen United States, be presented to Major General Gates, Commander in Chief in the northern department, and to Major Generals Lincoin and Arnold, and the reft of the officers and troops under his command, for their brave and fuccessful efforts in support of the independence of their country, whereby an army of the enemy of ten thousand men has been totally defeated ; one large detachment of it ftrongly posted and intrenched, having been conquered at Bennington; another repulsed with loss and difgrace from Fort Scn yler, and the main army of fix thousand men, under Lieutenant General Burgoyne, after being beaten in different actions, and driven from a formidable post and ftrong intrenchments, reduced to the necessity of furrendering themselves, upon terms honourable and advantageous to these States on the 17 h day of October laft, to Major General Gates; and that a medal of gold be struck under the direction of the board of war, in commemoration of this great event, and in the name of these United States prefented by the prefident to Major General Gates.

RESOLVED, That Congress have an high fense of the merit of Colonel Green, and the officers and men under his command, in their late gallant defence of the fort at Red-Bank, on Delaware River ; and that an elegant foord be provided by the board of war, and prefented to Colonel Green.

RESOLVED, That Congress have an high sense of the merit of Lieutenant Colonel Smith, and the officers and men under his command, in their late gallant defence of Fort Mifflin, on the river Delaware; and that an elegant fword be provided by the board of war, and prefented to Lieutenant Colonel Smith.

RESOLVED, That Congress have an high fense of the merit of Commodore Hazlewood, the commander of the naval force on Delavare river, in the fervice of the common wealth of Pennfylvania, and of the officers and men under his command, in their late gallant defence of their country against the British fleet, whereby two of their men of war were deftroyed, and four others compelled to retire; and that an elegant Tword be provided by the marine committee, and prefented to Commodore Hazlewood.
