Independency, with a cordial love between us, is one thing; with an union with our enemies fatal. From their independency a danger arifes from a great naval power; a danger alfo to our other polleilions. I do not think that we should yield to it, till our refources are much lowered. Independency is not beneficial to America. She cannot be fo happy, fo eafy, cannot have fuch perfonal liberty, as if the remains dependent on us. If independent, the must be loaded with heavy burthens, more heavy than the had; her perional liberty will not be to great. Her present fituation, as compared with ours, is ten times more grievous. Her farmers are ruined ; when all the necessaries of life fell at prices the most high, they are compelled to fell the produce of their land at a fmall price in comparison. I was affured that at Albany, tea, a necessary article there, fold a 10 dollars per pound; at falt at 30 dollars per bufhel. Thinking that men in this fituation will be inclined to peace upon just and reasonable terms, I move the house for leave to bring in two bills, &c. etc.

Draughts of the two bills were accordingly brought in by his fordinip, which will be inferted in our next, together with the reloiutions of Congress on the matter. The honourable board have taken up, and fully entered into the fpirit and intentions of this infidious plan, again circulated by the emiliaries of that haughty and imperious court, with a view, if pollible to delude us into a fatal lecurity, and remifion of our strenuous efforts, in our justinable defence; and have thereupon unanimoufly refolved, that the united states cannot hold any conference or treaty with any commissioners on the part of Great-Britain, unless they shall, as the first presiminary, withdraw their fleets and armies, or elfe, in politive and expreis terms, acknowledge the independence of the faid states. To which, may all the friends of American liberty fay, amen, amen !
