

The Fayetteville Races will commence on Thursday the 27th October next, free for any horse, mare or gelding, according to the common rules of racing. A subscription has been raised, for the purpose of forming a purse, to be run for, on that day.

By capt. Haacs, arrived at New-York from Baltimore, we learn, that he was boarded off Cape Henry by an officer of the Prevoyante, in company with the Resoluzion and Topaz, who informed him that they had taken Barney and his squadron.

Philip Parry Price, of Middleton, proprietor of a large tract of land on the Ohio, has been lately convicted in London, of enticing artificers to emigrate to the United States, and sentenced to pay a fine of 500l. ster. and to be confined in the prison of Newgate for one year. Mr. Price had been imprisoned previously upwards of 6 months; he had engaged labourers and cultivators to the number of 1300, the greater part of whom have since arrived in several parts of the United States.

By a gentleman who came passenger in the brig Commerce, arrived at New-York, we are informed, that success still attends the French army in Italy. Mantua, Placentia, and some other fortresses had fallen into their hands. He confirms the arrival of the French at Leghorn, but says, that the English there had conveyed most of their personal property to Venice and Corsica, and their moveable property they had assigned over to merchants in Leghorn, that it might appear Tuscan property.

The governor of St. Vincents has issued a proclamation dated the 19th of July, allowing the free importation of American produce into the island in American bottoms, for the period of 6 months.

Fifteen American vessels, were at Leogane, about the first of August under libel, and waiting for trial. They were taken under instructions for capturing vessels bound to English ports in Hispaniola. Thus when the Bermudians are actually reforming and quitting their infamous trade; we find the French degenerating and taking up the same piratical business; with even less colouring in general cases. Many of the vessels detained by the Bermudians were from French ports, that had been for a long time declared in a state of blockade, whether they actually were so or not; but the St. Domingo French have no pretence of the kind, either nominal or otherwise. It is uncertain what late may attend the above American vessels; but if the republicans carried them in merely to secure to their ports the provisions they might have on board, they would release them after their arrival, without any form of trial. The libeling of the vessels, however, renders it probable something serious is designed against them.

Extract of a letter dated Bourdeaux, July 12.

Numerous corps of troops are continually marching from La Vendee to Italy. Buonaparte's army will soon be 200,000 men strong. The left wing of that army, commanded by general Massena, had on the 1st inst. already pushed 20 leagues into Tyrol, and was marching against Brixen and Lienz. A column of the army of the Alps is advancing along the bank of the Inn, against Inspruck, the capital of Tyrol, and we expect that by this time the army of Italy, and that of the Rhine and Moselle will have effected their junction on the frontiers of Bavaria. The corps of 6000 Neapolitan horse, who had escaped with the Austrians after the battle of Borghetto, have surrendered to the republicans, and were sent to Brescia, Lodi, and Cremona. Their horses, saddles, &c. were delivered up to the republicans agreeably to treaty. It is also generally believed that an article of our treaty with Naples stipulates, that the king shall lend us five ships of the line and eight frigates.

The successes of our armies in Germany and Italy are so decisive, that the Emperor will soon share the fate of the king of Sardinia. It is expected that England will at last pay the price of all the countries which the French republic may agree to restore to the Pope, the Emperor and the German Princes at the conclusion of a general peace.

There is plenty of all kinds of provisions in France; and the crop of this year is richer yet than that of last year.
