alb. one and an half miles. In the fecond October meeting, 1794, he wan a handicap plate, two miles, beating the Duke of Graf ton's Garland, Lord Egremont's Cinnabar, Sir Charles Bunbury's Robin Gray, Mr. Taylor's Helmet, Dake of Queenfberry's bay filly, by Diamed, and Lord Tichfield's Quetlavaca.

In the Craven meeting, 1795. 8ft. he beat Lord Darlington's St. George, 8th. olb. four miles, for 300 guineas

In the first spring meeting, 1795, he won the main of the Oatland's takes, 200gs, each two miles, beating Mr. Wilfon's Bennington, Mr. Delme's Gabriel, and the Dake of Queensberry's Pecker.

In the Houghton meeting, 1795, 8ft. 4lb. received forfeit from Mr Boye's Volunteer colt, 7th. one mile, for 100 guineas.
