THE SCENE AT THE GALLOWS. &c., &c., &c., &c.

Worth, for the execution of Haywood, on the termination of the respite afforded him, all necessary arrangements were made by Deputy Sheriff Joseph D. Ballenger, who had been especially deputized by Sheriff Fleming, to conduct the ceremonies inseperable from the fatal occasion. attending physician Dr. White, Post Surgeon, restrained him, in his attempt to proceed to the performance, of his painful duty. The following certificate, fully attests his condition.

JOHN B. WHITE, M. D. Post Surgeon U. S. Army. In company with Dr. White we entered the Jail at eleven o'clock, and found the doomed man, surrounded by his friends, and in close converse in his spiratehantener. At quarter to twelve, he was taken from his cell, to the Northern door of the Jail, contiguous to which was the dreaded scaffold. A colored friend, whom he had chosen to attend him in his last moments, engaged him in fervent prayer and singing, in which Haywood joined with the atmost fervency and devo-

The time for the last grand act having arrived Banvester ascended the stepts, exclaiming, "! am going up! I an going up at last, nothing but liquor and ungodly company brought me here, I warn you all, to pray and not do as I have done it was liquor made me do what I did; hereupon he knelt down and delivered an earnest prayer, after which, he united with his colored friend Mr. Spicer, in singing a hymn. Again he exorted the by-standers, to let liquor alone and live so they might all meet in Heaven; his arms and legs were then bound, and as the bell was striking twelve, the white cap was drawn over his head, and the rope cut by Deputy Sheriff Jos. Ballenger, which launched the poor fellows soul into eternity.

In nine minutes after he fell. he was pronouned dead, by Dr. White Post Surgeon, his death being caused directly by asphyxia. After hanging fifteen minutes, his body was cut down, placed in his coffin, and delivered to his relatives. The assembled multitude on the street fronting the jail, behaved with the utmost decorum, deeply impressed with the awful scene, being enacted before them. Major Van Horn Pos: Commander was present on the ground, with a force sufficient to preserve order. Rev. Mr. Cohen, has delivered to us, a statement penned by him as the words fell from Haywood's lips, which the departed man desired to have published as

HIS DYING ADDRESS.

MY DEAR FYLLOW-MEN :- I want you now to listen to a fellow-creature who expects in a few minutes to stand before his maker and judge. I am about to be hung for kiling a fellow-be-

So far as the killing is concerned—she did come to her death at my hand, but I did not have any malice against her in my heart. I was under the influence of liquor at the time and was led through it to commit the horrible deed for which I am to forfeit my tife. O my fellew-men, let me entrust you to avoid the intoxicating cup. If I had been sober I could not have done such a dreadful thing. So any of you may take a little and a little more until you have taken a little too much and then you may do 16 months in jail and at last be hung up on the gallows. O what a dreadful thing liquor is. I would to God I had never tasted a drop then l would be at liberty and not be hung.

And if you will take the advice of a dying man you will bless God. Don't my fellow-men, don't take the first drop and then you will not be out of your sense or reason and do what may bring disgrace upon your family and yourself to a shameful end. By the kindness of many friends I have been allowed time to think. And I hope I have improved the time. I have felt myself a sinner and I have prayed unto God for forgive-ness and I believe He has heard my prayers and has forgiven my sin . I am prepared to die. I ing and seek a habitation elsewhere, to a people put my trust in Jesus as the Savior of men, as the only hope of a poor sinner. And I do hope to stand before my maker in peace. I have peace in my soul now because I trust in Jesus and I am thankful that he has not cut me off in

my sins. Now, dear fellow men it you want to be saved you must pray—you must give up your evil ways and live new lives-you must repent, and then we may hope to meet on Jordan's happy shore. where all is peac : forever and ever. Dear friends adjen-farewell, for ever, till we meet in Heaven.

I return my thanks to Mr. Ballenger for his kindness to me while I have been a prisoner in his charge, and to all the dear christian people who have labored with me and prayed with me. hope to meet them all in Heaven.

I thank Mr. Clark and Mr. Green for their in fluence in getting me another trial in last October, and to all the kind friends who obtained a espite for me, and to the Governor of the State for allowing me this long time, till now, that I might have time to prepare for Heaven. God less them all. And Mr. Manly, for getting me a new trial be-tore the Supreme Court, in Raleigh.

MR. EDITOR :- It may be of some interest to the public to learn a sheriff's experience in the performance of his duties. He has every opportunity to understand human nature as it developes tself under the various circumstances of life. The most irksome duty a sheriff has to discharge is the collection of taxes. Especially has this been the case since the close of the war. With the Union army came crowds of merchants with their goods and wares, who accumulated large gains, and when peace was proclaimed and our civil laws began to operate, were unwilling to bear their part of the public burdens. This was peculiarly the case with those who dealt in ardent spirits, where the profits were large, and Execution of Banvester Haywood. the taxes imposed very high. A little experience may serve to point a moral, if nothing else. What I am about to relate will be news only to

As you are aware, the State Convention, of 1865, levied a tax on liquors, cotton, tobacco, &c. Our citizens paid the tax or gave a bond for the payment of the same, except a frm that came with the war, transacting business under the name of Lambert & Hall. Lambert & Hall sneaked out of town, leaving the sheriff with the bag to

poses and provided that the Counties could, if necessary, double or treble the amount for County purposes. Carteret, being in debt, doubled her tax, as compared with that of the State, and the tax list was handed to the Sheriff at the time prescribed by law, to wit: July 1st, 1867. The tax was severe on liquor dealers especially. Mr. Allen, (Mayor, by order of Gen. Sickles,) of the firm of A. & S., kno ving that the old firm of Lambert & Hall had so successfully evaded their obl gation, thought he would try the same game. Finding the sheriff would not trust him and that he could not repeat the Lambert & Hall experiment, he hastened to Brevet Major Van Horn, represented the tax paid as an ex post facto law and, with other misrepresentations, induced the Major to issue an order to the sheriff to suspend the collection of taxes until instructions could be ceived from Gen. Sickles. Had not this gentleman better learn the difference of an ex post facto law before he makes such statements again? After waiting a long time to hear from Gen. Sickles, I concluded I would go to Raleigh to see the Governor on the subject. He telegraphed and wrote to the General but failed to get an answer. On the 4th of September, the Treasurer ssued a circular to the sheriffs and tax collectors concerning the taxes, and informed them if they did not settle with him by the 30th, he would en orce the penalties prescribed by law. He sald the Commanding General of the district had been urged to stop the collection of the tax, but had declined to interfere. When I saw this I was greatly surprised, as the Post commander had interfered with me and no orders had been received from the General commanding, and knowing if I did not obey the Post commander, I would be punished by him, and if I did. I would be punished by the Treasurer, I was in a ilemma. Some advised me one way and some another. I was perplexed in my own mind. After being in so much trouble, I was relieved by receiving a letter from Maj. Van Horn, dated Sept. 9th, stating that his order had been reseinded. So I proceeded to collect. I first called on Messrs. Allen & Suydam, thinking their case of more importance than any other, as I had not torgotten the old tricks of Lambert & Hall. But Mayor Allen (Mayor by order of Gen. Sickles) is not satisfied yet. He still contends that the tax is an ex post facto law, and employed a lawyer and tried to get an injunction from ENCOURAGE HOME MANUFACTURES. Judge Green to stop collection. At last, poor Mayor, failing in all his efforts, unlike Lambert & Hall, had to pay his tax. But this was not the only Sample of a yankee trick which I had to contend with, for a Sample in reality tried his band at the game. He was not as sharp, however, as Messrs. Lambert & Hall, nor was his ingenuity sufficient to master his difficulties. He knew the blow was heavy, but tried to lessen its weight by not giving in the amount of his purchases in 1865. He was trapped and had to pay a double just as I did and have to suffer as I have done tax. He tried the game again this year but failed. His dollars had to go where they belonged, and will help to defray the expenses of the State, for which he is willing to do so little. Another trick he tried, and that was to be Sheriff he also failed. When this Sample of human pature again tries to play his tricks let him apply to those expert gentlemen, Messrs. Lambert & Hall, for a little in struction and a Sample of their experience, Should they refuse him this great boon, he can, like them, change his sign to Kna-
