The columns of the Republican papers against Gov. Tilden, have been effectually silenced by the letter of Judge Sinnott. Even the leading papers of that party are becoming ashamed of the groundless charges against the honesty and integrity of our great leader. The New York Evening Post, a strong supporter of Hayes, has this to say in regard to these falsehoods:

"We do not hesitate to say that Governor Tilden's character as a citizen, long known in professional life in this city, entitles him to a verdict of acquittal upon the charges which have been brought against him," and says "it is to be hoped that the canvass will hereafter be conducted with less dependence on personal accusations."

G. M. Braxton Bragg dropped dead in the street of Galveston, Texas, on the 27th ult. He was born in Warren county, N. C., in 1837. He was educated at West Point and was in the U. S. army until 1856. He was promoted three times for gallantry in battle, at Fort Brown, Monterey and Buena Vista. He was in active service during the late war, beginning with the rank of Brigadier, and having that of a full General at its close. He was a great favorite of Jefferson Davis, and was his military advisor during the latter part of the war.

North Carolina All Right.

During the present week not less than one thousand North Carolinians have been in Baltimore. They represent almost every section of the Old North State, and both sides of party politics. Without an exception the Republicans came to the State to Vance and Tilden, while the Democrats and Conservatives claim majorities for their ticket ranging from 12,000 to twice that number in some. But the strongest evidence that we have recently seen, comes through a correspondent of the Cincinnati Commercial, one of the staunchest Republican journals in the West. This writer says, "notwithstanding the very gallant fight which Judge Steele is making, and the almost universal esteem in which he is held here, I see no probability of his election, or at least, but a very small probability. He will run ahead of his ticket, but at least 12,000 behind, an election. I expect Vance to carry the State by from 10,000 to 15,000 majority; and Tilden probably by 30,000. Since the Civil Rights excitement North Carolina has been undeniably Democratic. The Legislature is two to one Democratic; both U. S. Senators are Democrats, and every member of the House of Representatives, except one, belongs to the Democratic party. -Baltimorean."

STARTLING REVELATIONS.

ALLEGED CONFESSION OF EX-GOV. HOLDEN.

Republicans Responsible for the Stephens Murder.

THE TRUE INWARDNESS OF THE KIRK WAR-HOW MATERIAL WAS GOT FOR THE OUTRAGE MILL-REPUBLICAN RASCALITY AT RALEIGH AND WASHINGTON.

Testimony of Rev. C. T. Baily.

The following statement was taken by the special correspondent of the Raleigh News from Major John W. Scott, of Haywood, one of the worthiest, best known citizens of Chatham county, Thursday night at Sanford, Moore county:

Major Scott told our correspondent that on Wednesday night, at the hotel in Cameron, Moore county, Rev. C. T. Baily, editor of the Biblical Recorder, published in this city, made, in substance, the following statement in the presence of several gentlemen: That Ex-Governor W. W. Holden had on several occasions confessed to him [Baily] that the Republican party was responsible for the

MURDER OF J. W. STEPHENS, of Caswell county.

Mr. Baily said that the first time that Gov. Holden made this confession to him was on the train on the Raleigh & Augusta Railroad about two years ago, while en route to the Baptist State Convention at Fayetteville. He [Holden] said that the reason that Stephens was made way with was that he [Stephens] had threatened to expose the rascality of the Republican party. That at that time it was doubtful whether the Republican party could carry North Carolina and many of the Northern States in 1870 and to effect this it was necessary to keep up the

BLOODY SHEET ISSUE.

The leaders of the Republican party at Washington consulted with the leaders of that party in this State, Gov. Holden and others, and forced upon the Republican party of the State the Holden-Kirk war, even at the risk of losing North Carolina in order to save the States of the North. The plans of the Radical party, in the Kirk war, said Governor Holden to Mr. Baily, were only partially carried out. The portion of the plan not carried out was to

Dr. Roan and other prominent Democrats.

Holden also said to Mr. Baily that the authorities at Washington consulted four or five Federal Judges as to whether those arrested under the kirks charges could be lawfully convicted under the then existing laws. Their answer was that such convictions could not be constitutionally obtained. Judge H. L. Bond of the United States Circuit Court, was then consulted and said his pledge to carry out the wish of the government in the matter, in every particular, he was transferred from Maryland to North Carolina by order of President Grant. Governor Holden then went on to state that he had been promised

A CABINET OFFICE.

The Secretaryship of the Interior, if he succeeded in carrying out the wishes and designs of the Republican leaders at Washington.

The reason Governor Holden gave for not exposing these things publicly at that time was that his life would have been in danger and he would have been sacrificed as was Stephens.

The reason he [Holden] assigned for the stop of the Kirk war, was the release of the prisoners by order of Judge G. W. Brooks, of the United States District Court, and the danger of the evidence fastening the murder

REPUBLICAN PARTY.

This confession on the part of Holden, Mr. Baily said to Major Scott and the other gentlemen, was to induce him [Mr. Baily] to use his influence to get the Legislature to remove his [Holden's] disabilities, incurred by reason of his impeachment and conviction. Mr. Baily consented to do this upon his [Holden's] sacred promise never to have anything to do with politics.

Mr. Baily further stated that Gov. Holden had been to him several times during the past two years and repeated the above mentioned statements, and

reiterated his declarations of penitence and promises to eschew politics and other temptations likely to lead him into error.

Mr. Baily further stated to these gentlemen (Messrs. Scott and the others) that he had considered himself relieved from his obligations of secrecy by Holden's utter disregard of his

SACRED PROMISE

In regard to politics. The above is a simple and unvarnished statement of what Major J. W. Scott told our special correspondent, E. Conklin, at Sanford, Sept. 27, telling him that he got the facts direct from Rev. C. T. Baily. Now let Mr. Baily be heard in the matter. He is at present absent from the city. -Raleigh News.

The Enthusiasm of the Indiana Democrats-Monster Meetings

FRANKLIN IND., Sept. 23.-Fully twenty thousand people were present and the procession was nine miles in length, comprising several thousand wagons loaded with men, women and children, and it required two hours and twenty-eight minutes for the procession to pass a given point. How is that for a monster gathering of the people? How is that for a display in a small country town? Talk about your immense soldiers' Radical reunion at Indianapolis with your tugging about five or six thousand people, while right here in Franklin, Johnson county, Indiana, with the aid of little merry Shelby, we trot out nearly five times as many people, and turn out a procession nine miles long. Talk about the people not coming out in Southern Indiana to hear Democratic reform speeches and to hear honest Blue Jeans and brilliant Voorhees. Bah! Why Ben Harrison, O. P. Morton, or any other man in the Republican party never was greeted outside of Indianapolis with as large a crowd as that which greeted Uncle Jimmy and Mr. Voorhees here to-day. Talk about the crowd that Harrison had at Columbus and Shelbyville. Bless my soul, every mother's son of them could have been but in one corner of Franklin to-day and not attracted the slightest attention. Just think of it, dear reader, ponder over and reflect upon it. Twenty thousand people and a procession nine miles in length.

State Fair-Meeting of the Executive Committee.

leigh, and Col. Henry A. Ligon, of Pittsboro.

Various communications were considered and encouraging reports presented. The committee was also favored with suggestions in regard to the stock department from an experienced stock raiser.

The Secretary gives notice that practical and efficient men will be employed to care for the stock and poultry, and all parties making entries may be assured that their animals will be under good supervision.

Supervisors are particularly requested to notify the Secretary of their acceptance and are asked to be present promptly, on the first day of the Fair, to take charge of their respective departments.

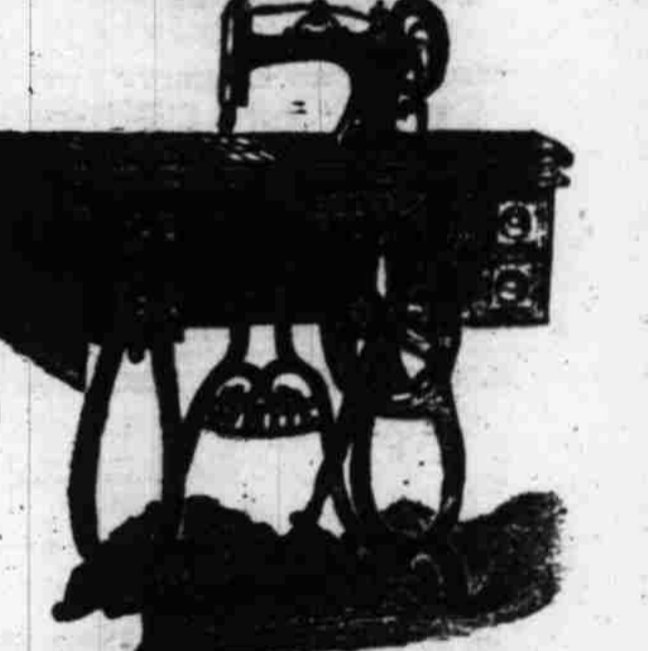
