NORTH CAROLINA. Asheville—Sewers and Brick.—F. M. Miller, city clerk, invites proposals till Oct. 5th for 540,000 brick, &c., for laying 2,100 feet of 24 inch brick sewers.

Blowing Rock—Hotel.—Abernethy Bros. talk of building the hotel previously reported.

Charlotte.—Mr. John R. Hall, who has sold his interest in the Normandy Cotton Mills, of Lowell, N. C., (reported at \$100,000), is preparing to organize some new enterprise in Charlotte.

Cronly—Bagging Factory.—The Acme Manufacturing Co., of Wilmington, will put in new machinery for manufacturing pine straw bagging.

Davidson County—Sulphur Mine.—Parties will develop the Welborn mine with a view to developing for the sulphur if found in sufficient quantities.

Durham—Cotton Mill.—The rumor referred to last week that A. M. Rigby and others will build a cotton mill is not correct.

Durham—Tobacco Factory.—Efforts are being made to organize a plug tobacco factory.

Egypt—Mining.—W. H. Seagraves has commenced coal mining on a large scale.

Gamewell—Tobacco Factory.—L. H. Tuttle, D. B. Tuttle and others will establish a plug tobacco factory, and have purchased machinery.

Greensboro—Depot.—The Richmond & Danville Railroad Co. contemplate building a new depot at a cost of \$30,000.

Greensboro—Gas Works and Electric Light.—The Greensboro Gas and Light Co., lately mentioned as organized to succeed the Greensboro Gas Co., and to enlarge their gas works and add an electric light plant, have purchased a controlling interest in the Greensboro Electric Light Co. They will probably not erect the new plant.

Lewisville—Saw Mill.—E. C. Dull will, it is reported, build a large saw mill.

Louisburg—Brick-yard.—A brick yard is contemplated, and O. L. Ellis & Co. want to correspond with manufacturers of such.

Lowell—Cotton Mill.—The Ren-Cotton Mills Co. has been organized, and has purchased the Normandy Cotton Mills of 7,500 spindles.

Raleigh—Hotel.—Efforts will be made to organize a company with a capital stock of from \$100,000 to \$150,000 to build a large hotel. Dr Everett can give information.

Raleigh—Tobacco Factory.—A \$25,000 stock company is being formed to start a plug tobacco factory. George W. Poe can give information.

Raleigh—Wagon Factory.—A \$15,000 stock company is being organized to establish a wagon factory. S. J. Montague can give information.

Reidsville—Electric Light Plant.—The city will decide by a popular vote on October 8th whether or not to issue of \$14,000 to purchase the electric light plant.

Salisbury—Lead and Zinc Mine.—The output of Silver Valley mine is being increased.

Salisbury—Mining.—Parties are negotiating for the Tripler mine, in Rowan county, with a view to developing.

Shelby—Wagon Factory.—J. W. Lineberger & Son will enlarge their wagon factory.
