Reported by W. L. MEADOWS, President of the Tobacco Association. HENDERSON, N. C., March 20, 1873. REMARKS.—The market for the past week, was not quite so active as the week previous, but prices for all desirable kinds, in good order are fully maintained. The policy pursued by many of the planters, of keeping back until later in the season, all of their tobacco, and sending forth all of their non-descript and undesirable kinds is disadvantageous to both seller and purchaser. Good desirable tobacco in fair order, are much sought after at all prices. We urge the farmers to have their tobacco well assorted and in good order before sending it to market, and then in as large lots as practicable. Fine tobacco in good order, in demand and will bring high prices.
