Last week we published the horribl and fatal bulloon ascension, of Mr. Thurston; and below present an account of another perilous balloan vayage which took place a few days since at the Fair Grounds, at Centralia, Illinois, as follows:

As soon as it was possible, an Extra was issued at Centralia, and the whole neighboring country placed on the alert to watch for the balloon and children.

Saturday morning at daybreak, a farmer near New Carthage, forty three miles distant from Mr. Harvey's place, discovered the balloon suspended in the air, attached by the grappling rope to a tree in his yard. He immediately hauled the balloon down, and found the youngest child a deep in the bottom of the basket, and the eldest carefully watching over her little brother .-They had been wafted about by different currens of air throughout the night, and had come to a halt but a little while before they were relieved.

BURNING OF THE AUSTRIAL!

OVER FIVE HUNDRED LIVES LOST !!! The Steamer Austria, from Hamburg for the United States, with 480 passettgers and 100, crew, was entirely consumed by fire on the 18th September, and

STATEMENT OF MR. BREW. I took passage at Southampton on the 4th, in the steamship Austria, Capt. Heydtmonn, which left Hamburg second. We sailed at 5 P. M., the evening being a little misty, we in consequence anchored between the Isle of Wight and the main land, sailed again at 4 o'clock on the following morning. In weighing anchor an unfortunate accident occurred by which one of the crew lost his life; owing to some mismanagement the anchor ran out whirling the captain round with terrific force, hurling the men in all directiona; two were severly injured, and one thrown overboard : he was supposed to have been instantly killed as he never rose to the

From the time the ship was laid on her course we experienced strong westerly winds. On the 12th the weather was more favorable, and on the 13th a speed of eleven knots had been attained, and all were in high hopes of reaching New York by the 18th. At a little after 2 o' clock, P. M., I was on the quarter decks; sawa dense volume of smoke burst from the after entrance of the steerage. Some women ran after exclaiming "the ship is on fire, what will become of us!" The ship was instantly put at half speed, at which she continued until the magazine exploded, from which I infer the engincers were instantly suffocated. I only walked from where I was on the quarter deck to the waist of the ship, when I saw the flames breaking through the lights amidships. As the ship was head to the wind, the fire traveled with fearful rapi-

I then went to the man at the wheel, and told him to put the vessel with her side to the wind. He hesitated-probably did not understand me, as he was a native of Hamburg. I then got a German gentlem in to speak to him. At this time I saw some persons letting down the boat on the port side of the quarter deck. What became of the boat I don't know, but think she was crushed under the screw. I then went to get a boat over from the star-board side of the quarter deck, but the moment we laid our hands on the ropes, there were so many people who crowded into it that we could not lift it off the blocks.
