Tax Journal Clerk of the House of Representatives has just prepared a roll of all the members of the Forty-First Congress who have taken the oath of office.

It is suggested that in a State Labor Convention the following wants be attended to: viz: A system by which the laborer working for ten dollars a month may be sure of getting that ten dollars; a system under which the laborer who works land for one-third, or any greater share of the crop, may be sure of getting that full share in a fair division; a system under which the laborer who rents land will pay a fair price and be sure of having the crop when he has raised it.

The first step in this matter is to discuss and agree upon a rate of wages, and make the rates for full hands as nearly uniform as possible, for each neighborhood.

It is also suggested that a sort of intermediate or special Court be created in each county, to adjudicate just these cases, to secure mutual justice and fair play between planter and laborer, and to protect the laborer from the downright fleecing which is, to a greater or less degree, practiced in every community.
