With a view of facilitating the introduction into manufacturing of the new motor which the Winters Manufacturing Company intend to generate from pure water by means of engines plentifully supplied with valves, Mr. Winters and Mr. Lawrence called on Wednesday at the office of the board of underwriters and obtained written instructions to submit a portion of the general gas to a chemist for the purpose of ascertaining whether or not it is inflammable and whether or not it is explosive when brought in contact with fire. During the afternoon Mr. C. M. Stillwell, of 18 Exchange place, was engaged to make the required analysis. While awaiting the arrival of the chemist, Mr. Winters turned the water into the model engine in his Brooklyn workshop, and connected the tank, which was speedily filled, with his upright six-horse power gas engine.

"I was afraid it would frighten you if I showed you what could be done with this engine when you called the other day," he said. Then he turned on the gas and drove the engine wheel around for ten minutes, at the rate of 300 revolutions a minute. The gas was turned off before half of it had been exhausted. Mr. Winters said that there was yet power enough in the five gallon tank from which he had been drawing the gas to run a twenty or so power engine.

"Do you intend to apply the motor at first only to the Second Avenue cars?" was asked.

"Oh, no, not if we can make immo- diate arrangements to have it applied elsewhere, as we are trying to do. The trouble is at present, that every one who suspects us, we have submitted the generating engine to the fullest inspection, and the experts have expressed themselves satisfied. Nevertheless I believe that they are disposed to believe that it may be a trick. I hope the analysis may rid them of any such suspicion. Now, suppose the elevated road company should permit us to supply them with it, they would save money at once. The best would be but half that of steam, and one man with sense enough to push a lever and put on the brakes could run an engine. Then there would be no dust, clatters or sparks, of which they complain. We might apply it to manufactories to run lathes or any small machines, which are now run by treadles, by hand or by steam, at an equal saving. As I told you the other day, it can be applied to anything to which steam is now applied.

The United States Senate is not the liveliest body in the world, and the prospect of six full years more of Voorhees' interminable platitudes is one from which Senators and the country at large ought to be relieved as soon as possible.
