LECTURE OF THE RT. REV BISHOP KEAN, AT THE OPERA HOUSE, FRIDAY NIGHT.—Right Rev. Bishop Kean, a Roman Catholic Prelate, distinguished as an orator and a man of great ability and learning, on Friday night, in response to the invitation of Messrs. Joseph E. Sampson, J. C. Hill, W. K. Price, Anthony Howe, Geo. L. Mabson and A. P. Howe, leading colored men of this city, delivered a very eloquent and impressive lecture, taking for his subject the history of the Catholic Church, and explanatory of its teachings and doctrines.

There was a goodly number of our colored citizens present and also a large number of our white citizens, seats having been especially provided for the latter, though the lecture was mainly intended for the former.

The Right Rev. lecturer, in his impassioned and eloquent style, gave a short account of the prosperity and success of the colored Catholic of Baltimore, and Washington, D. C., of their fine churches, and organs, trained choir and excellent free schools, some of which were presided over by colored Sisters of Charity, where young women of the colored race received first class religious and secular educations. He stated that one of the objects his administration of the Catholic interests diocese, would be to advance the spiritual welfare of the colored race and open to them all the advantages enjoyed by the Catholics of the colored race of the cities of Baltimore and Washington.

The Bishop then gave a lengthy, but highly interesting explanation of the doctrines and teachings of the Catholic Church; stated that within her fold there was no discrimination on account of wealth or race, that all partook at the same communion rail. He spoke of the sacrament of the Church, quoted the scriptural authority for them, claimed that the Catholic Church was the divinely appointed teacher, to man, gave a summary of his doctrine regarding the Virgin Mary, stated that Catholics did not adore her, but gave her honor as being the mother of Christ.

He showed from argument and illustration, what was the influence for good of the Catholic Church, and finally closed his lecture after an exceedingly eloquent and beautiful exhortation "for peace among all men."

We venture the assertion that our colored friends were very thankful to this learned man for a couple of hours pleasant and useful, and we can bear witness that they were much impressed by the marked attention they paid. We have never seen at any place more respectful and appreciative, and we are sure the good Bishop carried away with him the pleasant impressions of our colored people.

EDITOR POST.—The election is progressing quietly and harmoniously and there is no probability of a disturbance whatever. Many rumors have been circulated that there would be no election in this county, such, I think, and I know to be unfounded. The Magistrates from each township in this county met at Lockwood's on last June, I think about the 15th, and ordered (after having appointed the poll holders for the different townships) that the said poll holders should act in both elections, that is for the election held in August last, and that which is being held to-day. From some cause or other, the poll or registration books for north-west township was left in the register's office here until within a few days ago when Sheriff Taylor took it, and delivered it to the proper person. It is quite likely that the polls will be open in that township, but the returns may be thrown out. Such will be a loss to our candidate.

There is but little interest, or concern manifested in this election by either party. The Greenbacks, with only one exception that I know of, will vote solid for Russell. Several Democrats will not go to the polls, and there are some of that party who have already voted for the Greenbacker. The action of the late Board of Canvassers, gave the death blow to Democracy in this county. Time cannot resurrect it, I will give you the returns of the different townships as soon as I can.
