State Republican Plan of Organization.

Rules and Regulations for the Organization of the Republican Party of North Carolina.

I. County Organization.—The election precinct shall be the unit of county organization. Each precinct shall be organized by three active Republicans.

II. Congressional, Judicial and Senatorial Districts.—There shall be a Congressional, judicial and Senatorial District Committee, composed of not less than one member from each county, not less than seven members, biennially elected by the district conventions.

III. State Executive Committee.—There shall be a State Executive Committee, composed of one member from each Congressional District in the State to be designated by the district dele-

gations in state convention assembled; two members at large, to be elected by the state convention, and the chairman of the convention at which the election is held. They shall be biennially elected at the state convention, shall choose one of their number number chairman and shall elect a secretary who is not a member, who shall reside at Raleigh.

IV. The chairman of the respective county, district and state executive committees shall call their conventions to order and act as temporary chairmen until a permanent organization is effected, with power only to appoint and receive the report of a committee or credentials.

V. No executive committee shall have power to elect or appoint delegates to any convention, whether county, district, state or national.

VI. No member of an executive committee or delegates or alternates duly chosen shall have power to delegate his trust or authority to another.

VII. Representation.—Representation in county conventions shall consist of three Republican voters as delegates, and three as alternates from each precinct in the county, and no more.

VIII. Representation in congressional, judicial, senatorial and state conventions shall consist of two delegates and two alternates and two alternates only, for every member of the Lower House of the General Assembly and shall be apportioned in the several counties accordingly.

IX. Delegates and alternates to county conventions shall be elected only by a vote of the Republicans of each precinct in precinct meeting assembled; and delegates and alternates to district, state and national conventions shall be elected by a convention of delegates duly elected and sent by the people for that purpose after due notice and publication of not less than fifteen days, of the time, place and purpose of such convention.

X. The certificate of the chairman and secretary of the meeting calling the county, district, state or national meeting, or of the delegate and alternate thereat, shall be accepted, when presented, as a good and sufficient credential for such delegate and alternate.

XI. This plan of organization and the rules and regulations hereunder shall be subject to the approval of the State Executive Committee.

WILMINGTON MARKETS.

Aug. 21. SPIRITS TURPENTINE.—The market was quiet at 31 1/2 cents per gallon for regular packages, with sales reported later of 150 casks at 32 cents.

ROBIN.—The market was firm at \$1 02 1/2 for Strained and \$1 07 1/2 for Good Strained, with sales as offered.

TAR.—Market opened quiet at \$1 70 per bbl, of 280 lbs, with sales at that price, but later sales were effected at \$2 05, closing steady at the market.

CRUDE TURPENTINE.—The market was firm at \$1 80 for Yellow Dip, and \$2 25 per bbl for Virgin, with sales at quotations.

COTTON.—The market was steady, with small sales at quotations. Futures for August opened in New York at 11 1/2 cents and closed firm at 11 3/4 cents; October opened at 10 1/2 cents and closed firm at 10 3/4 cents.
